CITY, COUNTY TEACHERS TO MEET MONDAY

A teachers' meeting lasting all day Monday, August 30, and including both city and county elementary and high school instructors will herald the opening of school next week. This is the first joint city and county teachers' meeting in a number of years.

Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, as well as Dr. Frank Parr, executive secretary of the Oregon State Teachers' association, and Joy Hills, state department of education, will participate in the program. Local school officials will also speak.

At 9:30 a. m., Monday, the program will start with a general meeting of the Klamath County Oregon State Teachers' association at Klamath Union high school with Mrs. Joanna Givan, presiding. There will be group singing with Andrew Loney as leader. A business meeting at which Mayor Houston will appear briefly, will follow. A violin solo by John O'Connor, accompanied by Mrs. O'Connor will be featured.

Also scheduled for the morning session is a talk titled "Immediate Outlook for Education in Oregon" by Dr. Frank Parr of Portland. Joy Hills of Salem will speak on "Curriculum Changes in Oregon Schools." Rex Putnam will give an address on "A Message to Teachers."

At 1:30 p. m., county teachers will meet in the gymnasium of the Altamont Junior high school with Fred Peterson presiding.

Group meetings will start at 2 p. m. The Junior-senior high schools will meet in the music room at Altamont with Miss Hills as speaker. Intermediate grade teachers are to go to room 5 to meet with Isabelle Brixner. Mary McComb will speak to primary teachers in room 7 and bus drivers are to meet in room 10.

Principals and coaches are to meet in room 11 at 2:30 and music teachers in room 12 at that same time.

City teachers are also to have an afternoon program. A meeting of cafeteria cooks is scheduled for Saturday, September 4 at 10 a. m. at Altamont Junior high cafeteria.

CLASSES AT MERRILL OPEN NEXT TUESDAY

MERRILL.—Students in the Merrill elementary and high schools will report for classes next Tuesday morning, August 31. There will be no teachers meeting Monday but teachers will meet Tuesday afternoon following classes, it was announced by George N. Elliott, who succeeds E. E. Kilpatrick this year as principal of the high school. Mr. Elliott will also serve principal of the grade school.

Teachers on Monday, August 30, will attend sessions of the Oregon State Teachers' association at the KUHS and in the afternoon will attend a sectional meet in the Altamont Junior high school.

In the high school E. E. Evans of Chiloquin will teach science and social studies, George Hoops will teach shop and boys' physical education, Estrid Geraghty will teach the seventh grade and music, Beulah Elliott will have charge of the eighth grade and the high school home economics class.

Elliott will teach commercial and some math. Other math classes will be handled by another member of the faculty.

Shop and home economics are being offered again this year.

Olivia Hobbs will teach the fifth and sixth grades in the elementary building, Mrs. Ritchie the third and fourth, and Mrs. Ora Burkes the first.

Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Morrow will drive the buses and take care of the janitor work.

Elliott stated that the cafeteria will not be open on the first day of school since it has been impossible to engage a cook. Students are asked to come prepared with their own lunches.

KENO SENIOR HIGH PUPILS ATTEND KUHS

It has definitely been decided that the three upper grades of Keno high school students will be brought to Klamath Union high school this year with the lower grades, including the ninth, continuing at Keno as usual.

A bus will come from Worden and will make connections with a bus leaving Keno for Klamath Falls, according to county school officials. No bus will go from Weyerhaeuser camp to Keno this year. Grades from 1 to 8 will be held at Weyerhaeuser Camp 4 and any students from there entering high school will come to Klamath Falls or some other community to go to school. The county school district will pay part of the board and room for such students.
