## Cannery Wage Issue Settled

ASTORIA, Aug. 28 (AP)—The long-standing pay dispute between Columbia river fish cannery operators and employes was over today, with the workers awarded a 15 per cent wage increase.

The regional War Labor board made the raise retroactive to May 1, endorsed the check-off system of union dues payments and denied authorization for a 44-hour week.

That sent the wage scale for members of the AFL Columbia river fishermen's protective union at 66 cents an hour for women, up to \$1.10 for experienced fillet butchers.

## British Naval Losses in Sicily Campaign Totaled

LONDON, Aug. 28 (AP)—The British admiralty announced today that British naval losses in the Sicilian campaign were two submarines, three motor torpedo boats and one motor gunboat.

The submarines were the Saracen and the Parthian.

"These were the only losses of his majesty's ships during the whole of the Sicilian operations," the communique said.

## Dam Construction Considered in Idaho

KALISPELL, Mont., Aug. 28 (AP)—The proposed construction of a dam at Albeni Falls on the Clark Fork river in North Idaho to create storage facilities for 1,500,000 acre-feet of water still is under consideration, Bonneville Administrator Dr. Paul J. Raver said Friday.

"Doesn't that mean," he was asked by Rep. Compton White of Idaho, chairman of a house committee conducting a hearing here, "that you are trying to make a sacrifice of Idaho people instead of Montanans?"

## Two States Press Oregon For Navy Enlistment Honors

Oregon's lead in enlistment of men for the U. S. navy's construction battalions (Seabees) is being seriously threatened, according to reports just received by D. T. Schreiber of the Klamath Falls recruiting station. Latest figures reveal that Oregon is being closely pressed by Washington and Utah for leadership in Seabee recruiting this month and that a spurt is needed if this state retains the honors.

August's national call for Seabees is by far the largest ever scheduled, and this district must do its part if Oregon is to meet its quota, Schreiber emphasizes.

At present any man between 17 and 50, inclusive, may volunteer for the navy's construction battalions. Those in the draft ages, 18 to 37, inclusive, may volunteer through their induction boards, provided they can qualify for skilled trade ratings now available. Those in the non-draft ages may volunteer for either skilled or non-skilled ratings.

## Lack of Clues Handicaps Search For Tacoma Slayer

TACOMA, Aug. 28 (AP)—Detective Captain William E. Farrar said Friday that a lack of clues is handicapping police search for the young, dapper-dressed robber who fatally shot Herbert E. Burchfield, 75, tavern proprietor, early yesterday morning.

"All we have to work on is a description of the man," said Farrar. "We are not even certain whether he used an automobile in the getaway or not. But we are searching every means in our power."

The robber shot Burchfield in the presence of the latter's elderly wife during a holdup of the tavern in which he took \$65 to \$70.

## STUFFED TOMATOES

- 6 Firm tomatoes
- 1/2 cup finely chopped cold chicken, veal or beef
- 1 1/4 cups soft bread crumbs
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 egg

Wash and remove thin slices from stem end of tomatoes. Take out seeds and pulp, sprinkle inside of tomatoes with salt, invert, and let stand one-half hour. Cook the butter and finely chopped onions five minutes; add three-fourths cup of the bread crumbs, cold chicken or meat, tomato pulp and salt and pepper to taste. Cook five minutes, then add the egg slightly beaten, cook one minute, and refill tomatoes with mixture. Place in greased pan, sprinkle with remaining bread crumbs (buttered), and bake twenty minutes in a hot oven.
