### Memorial Continental Hall in Washington Turned Over to American Red Cross

Memorial Continental hall, Washington, D. C., built by the Daughters of the American Revolution, has gone to war and will be occupied "for the duration" by the American Red Cross.

Gone are the priceless colonial furnishings and antiques. Museum cases have been removed to storage space in the basement. In their place are long tables stacked high with flannels, bandages, baby clothes and woolens. The massive rooms that once housed priceless relics of a bygone era have been transformed into veritable workshops.

Mrs. Charles Carroll Haig, national D.A.R. chairman of buildings and grounds, in turning the building space over to J. Clifford Folger, Red Cross chapter chairman of District of Columbia, said:

"Memorial Continental Hall is the heart of the great D.A.R. headquarters center in the nation's capital. We are glad that these rooms will be of service in aiding our country in the war effort."

Red Cross activities in the newly-acquired space will include hospital and recreation (Gray Ladies), nurses' aids, army and navy auxiliary, staff assistance, camp and hospital, canteen, nutrition, dietitian's aids and the Red Cross motor corps.
