

BPW TO OPEN FALL SEASON WITH DINNER

The first meeting of the Klamath Falls Federation of Business and Professional Women for the fall season was set for Monday evening, September 6, at a meeting of the club's executive board held last night at the chamber of commerce.

It will be a dinner meeting at the Willard hotel at 6:30 o'clock, followed by a program that will be more or less informal. A number of new members will be welcomed at this time, and an invitation is issued to the many women now working in numerous new fields opened up by war necessity.

'LOWER 13' VICTIM LEAVES NO ESTATE

ALBANY, Aug. 31 (P)—Martha Virginia James, lower 13 murder victim, left no estate in Oregon, Probate Judge E. G. Arnold ruled yesterday in discharging L. Orin Sismore, Klamath Falls district attorney, as administrator.

Sismore said he had learned Oregon law does not recognize a \$10,000 claim against the Southern Pacific railway as part of Mrs. James' estate. Mrs. James' throat was slashed last January as she lay in lower 13 berth of a Southern Pacific train passing through Oregon. Robert E. Lee Folkes, negro dining car cook, is under death sentence in the state penitentiary for the slaying.

Youth Arrested With Two Revolvers; Admits Holdups

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31 (P)—A 17-year-old youth, arrested last night with two revolvers in his possession, admitted 19 recent hotel holdups on the Pacific coast, Detective Capt. T. T. Schulp said today.

The youth, who identified himself as Robert Peterson, Feeding Hills, Mass., admitted four holdups here, five in Seattle, four in San Francisco, four in Los Angeles and two in Long Beach, Schulp said.

He was charged with carrying concealed weapons. Bail was set at \$3000.

Nazi Shell Blasts Last Sutter Hope for Net Title

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 31 (P)—At 26, Lt. Ernest Sutter is through with competitive tennis—his career ended by a German shell which pierced his racket arm at Mateur—and thus goes glimmering the last Sutter hope for the national championship.

For several years the Sutter boys of New Orleans—first Cliff, then Eddie, then Ernie—have been bidding for the highest United States net crown. Cliff came close—within two points, in fact—and Ernie was the boy they said would go all the way.

But came North Africa and now the youngest Sutter boy, the former national intercollegiate and southern champion, is in

Kennedy Army hospital here recuperating from wounds which he says will prevent him from ever taking the competitive court again.

"I was in anti-aircraft," said the stocky young lieutenant. "I was knocking up a few lobbs at the German Stukas during the last stages of the North African campaign. A shell went clean through my right arm and another hit me in the head, knocking my steel helmet 30 feet.

"The doctors say they should be able to make my right arm 100 per cent new again but it would take me a couple or three years to get strength back in it. I'll never play tournament tennis again."

LAKE MILK MEN GET PRICE RAISE

Milk producers in Lake county have been granted a price raise from 70 to 80 cents, OPA announced today. This price raise was brought about to conform with the 13 cent retail price established several months ago, since it was believed fair to pass a part of the increased retail price on to the milk producers.

A meeting with Lake county producers was held August 21 in Lakeview. Immediate action was taken on the request for an increase in prices due to the co-operation of producers in the section, according to Clifford Jackson, OPA price specialist here. Producers filled out operating statements showing the increase in operating costs.

Montana Man Named Director For Northwest WLB

SEATTLE, Aug. 31 (P)—Robert C. Line, dean of the Montana State university school of business administration, has been named director of wage stabilization for the northwest regional war labor board, Dr. George Bernard Noble, board chairman, announced yesterday.

He will have jurisdiction over Washington, Oregon and Alaska.

Allied Warships Shelled by Nazi Long-Range Guns

LONDON, Aug. 31 (P)—The German international information bureau reported that Nazi long-range batteries shelled seven allied warships spotted close to the British southeast coast of Dungeness this afternoon, hitting several of them in a 20-minute bombardment.

The ships escaped behind a smokescreen, said the broadcast, recorded by The Associated Press. There was no allied confirmation of the report.

Former Washington Governor Defendant In Divorce Suit

SPOKANE, Aug. 31 (P)—Sue for divorce from former Governor Clarence D. Martin has been filed in superior court here by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Martin. She charges that her husband absented himself for long periods without explanation and that he refused to establish a home for her.

Martin, former head of the F. M. Martin Milling company at Cheney, served two terms as governor preceding the election of Governor Arthur B. Langlie. He disposed of his milling interests and his Cheney home last spring.

Army Allows Small Trash Fires Here

SALEM, Aug. 31 (P)—State Forester N. S. Rogers said today his office and the army would allow burning of small trash fires in Oregon agricultural areas, since weather conditions have greatly reduced the forest fire hazard. Restrictions on slash burning still are in effect.

This Miss Was Fatal

MARIETTA, Ill., Aug. 31 (P)—Without wavering once in his aim, Roy Poole, 62, of Henry, Ill., has thrown knives at his wife, Ethel, 56, to outline her figure, and shot pieces of chalk from her ears through 41 years of vaudeville performances.

After several years retirement, the team, known as "Bill Cody and Buckskin Ethel," made their first appearances at the annual Marietta homecoming celebration Saturday night. Finishing the knife throwing in the second performance of the evening, they went into their shooting act.

After his wife had placed the chalk pieces in her ears, Poole raised his .22 caliber rifle, took aim and fired. As the 300 spectators gazed in stunned surprise, Mrs. Poole sank to the floor, fatally wounded with a bullet hole through her head.

Coroner W. T. Yates of McDonough county pronounced the shooting accidental after an inquest yesterday.

OPA TO EXPLAIN USED GOODS PRICE

A meeting to acquaint dealers with the office of price administration's new over-all regulation controlling prices of 15 kinds of used consumers' durable goods will be held in Klamath Falls Wednesday, September 1, it was announced today by Clifford Jackson, OPA district price officer.

The new regulation, Jackson said, provides a simple pricing formula and covers not only specified used articles but the same commodities when rebuilt, reconditioned or renovated.

Previously, the prices of such commodities were held to the March, 1942 level, under the general maximum price regulation. Under the new regulation, effective September 1, dealers in used goods will be given a simpler and more precise formula for determining price ceilings, Jackson said.

The meeting will be held in the Balsiger building, beginning at 8 p. m. Wednesday.

NAZIS REPORT MINOR LANDING TRY IN ITALY

LONDON, Aug. 31 (P)—The German radio declared today that British troops attempted a minor landing in Italy southeast of Reggio Calabria across from Sicily, but that it was "immediately scotched."

The German broadcast was recorded by Reuters. No details were given.

Reggio Calabria lies just across the strait of Messina from Sicily, and a landing to the "southeast" would have been on the very bottom of the toe of Italy.

The landing was attempted Sunday by 400 men, the broadcast said.

The German reports brought no official comment in London and were viewed with skepticism.

It was felt here that if any landing was made it might have been a small-scale, hit-and-run attack against some enemy installations, a reconnaissance penetration or feint to keep the enemy defenses on edge and cover activities elsewhere.

No announcement was expected from the allied command.
