RAILROADS SEEN AS BULWARK OF NATION

If the railroads are soundly positioned financially after the war, they should continue to be a bulwark to the prosperity of the country is the opinion of A. T. Mercier, president of the Southern Pacific company.

Financially strong railroads could serve the nation, he said, not only by providing efficient and economical mass transportation, but also by turning purchasing power into channels of trade through vast sums paid in wages and through very heavy purchases of materials and supplies.

The western railways are handling by far the greatest traffic load in all their history, and this load is expected to increase, he continued. Southern Pacific's coast lines traffic for the first half of 1943 compared with the first half of 1939 show an increase of 168 per cent in ton miles and 335 per cent in passenger miles.

We shall push forward until the battle of the South Pacific becomes the battle of Japan.—Adml. William F. Halsey.

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PACKAGES FOR PRISONERS OF WAR IN JAPAN

The Pacific area office of the American Red Cross advises today that all next of kin on the Pacific coast who have not been able to send a package to their boys who are prisoners of war of Japan because of the set-up time of the sailing of the Gripsholm,

may have a box sent for them by the Red Cross in New York.

They may wire the Prisoners of War information bureau, Provost Marshall General at Washington D. C., giving the name of the next of kin and the full name and address of the prisoner.

The provost marshal will issue a label to the New York Red Cross and a box will be sent to the prisoner. The contents will be different than the regular food parcel so that it will be more personal, but the exact articles provided have not been announced.

RODEO SPRINGS FOREST FIRE CAMP CLOSED

Since the majority of the boys who have been working at the Rodeo Springs fire camp have gone back to school, this fire camp has been closed, Klamath Forest Protective association officials said today.

The camp at Penny Springs on the Greensprings highway will

be kept up for a while with a limited personnel, since many of these boys have also returned to school. In all, there will be three boys at the camp, Robert Benson, Malcolm Epley Jr., and Walter Knapp, along with the forester in charge.

In addition, there will be the regular lookouts who will stay at their posts until the end of the fire season, depending on the weather. The dry weather of the present time is especially dangerous for fires, and the public was urged to use extra caution in preventing fires.

Work this summer in the fire camps consisted of repair and maintenance work as well as some construction work.

At Rodeo Springs the boys erected 17 miles of telephone lines, repaired other lines, and

did maintenance work on the roads, putting in culverts and removing rocks.

Penny Springs youths built about four miles of new road into virgin territory on Butte mountain, where there had been no roads previously. Fires in this area were particularly dangerous because there was no way of getting to them, so the new road was especially valuable. Next year it is planned that the road will be continued in order to encircle Butte mountain and tying into another road.

CORN MEAL MUFFINS

- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 cup Albers Corn Meal
- 1/2 tps. salt
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tps. sugar
- 1 cup sweet milk
- 4 tps. baking powder
- 2 tps. melted shortening
