STOCKS SWING INTO ACTIVE RECOVERIES

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (AP)—The stock market today emerged with a broad and relatively active recovery and led mainly by industrial favorites with bright peace prospects.

Persistently cheerful war news inspired selective purchases, brokers said, but in many instances commitments were reinstated on the idea the recent drying up of selling meant the list might be getting set for a resumption of the bull swing.

Improved tendencies appeared at the opening and the ticker tape quickened during the forenoon. Gains of a point or more were whittled after mid-day by profit taking. Near-closing prices generally were higher, transfers were around 650,000 shares.

Consolidated Laundries, Dome Mines and Allied Mills edged to peaks for 1943. Popular also were General Motors, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Goodrich, Goodyear, Armour, Wilson & Co., McIntyre Porcupine, Montgomery Ward, Pepsi-Cola, Homestake Mining, Consolidated Edison and Southern Pacific. Steels, oils, copper and rails were narrow.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Aug. 31 (AP)—A strong undertone developed in wheat today despite rather cautious and quiet trading and prices inched forward to the best levels since early in July.

Trade was slowed by uncertainty over the amount of the notices of intention to deliver wheat on September contracts which were scheduled to be filed after the market closed.

Wheat eased off toward the finish and closed below the day's peak, but was 1-1c cent above yesterday's close, September \$1.46 1/2, oats unchanged to 1c down, September 74-74 1/2, and rye was mixed 1 cent lower to 1 cent higher, September \$1.03 1/2.

A report by the bureau of agricultural economics estimating that 425,000,000 bushels of wheat will be fed to livestock this fall and winter, an increase of 90,000,000 bushels over previous estimates, stimulated the wheat market mildly.
