

BOARD PLANS FOR SALVATION ARMY DRIVE

With Leslie Rogers named as co-chairman with Mitchell Tillotson, the drive for \$6000 for the Salvation Army gets underway in Klamath Falls this week. Board members at a meeting Tuesday made final plans for the campaign.

Of the \$6000 to be raised, \$1100 is for the Boys' club, now operating in the Salvation Army building under a cooperative arrangement with the city recreation committee. The committee will provide \$900, making a total of \$2000 for the Boys' club.

According to Major W. C. Curry, Salvation Army leader here, various plans have been made for strengthening the work of the Boys' club. A room for model airplane work will be established. Rev. F. C. Wissenbach will give informal talks on minerals. An effort will be made to stimulate boys' interests in various hobbies.

The Salvation Army is now within \$900 of being out of debt on the building at Fourth and Main streets, and that sum is in the budget for lifting the mortgage.

For general operation of the Army in the coming year, \$4000 is in the budget to be raised.

Contrary to some opinion, the army is still carrying on considerable relief work, the advisory board pointed out. In the past year it provided for individuals 176 beds and 436 meals, 310 garments and shoes, and gave transportation to five distressed persons. Some 222 families were helped, 713 food portions given out, 275 garments and shoes provided, and there were 229 office interviews.

The Army here gave help to five unwed mothers, giving 386 days of care to mothers and 469 days of care to babies.

Land Exclusion Asked in Court

A petition for exclusion of lands was filed in circuit court Tuesday by William C. Hackler and Ira F. Orem.

The petition asks the exclusion of their lands from the boundaries of Meadows Drainage district and that their lands be free from taxation, assessments or charges by the Meadows district.

The trend was upward from the fairly active opening. Toward the fourth hour the forward slant was general.

Turnover totaled about 550,000 shares for the full day.

On the upside were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Douglas Aircraft, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, American Telephone, Consolidated Edison, North American, Westinghouse, American Can, Air Reduction, Santa Fe, Northern Pacific and Chesapeake and Ohio. Western Union, Du Pont and Glenn Martin were backward.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 (P)—Rye futures urged upward about 3 cents at times in an active, nervous trade today, supported by buying from a leading commission house with connections throughout the east. Price changes were rapid and the market lost more than a cent of its upturn toward the close.

Feed manufacturers were reported on the buying side of rye on the upturn and the advance was accelerated by uncovering of stop-loss orders. Wheat and oats, in which trading was quiet, were ahead of yesterday's close most of the day but slumped later when rye reversed its trend. Wheat fell below yesterday's final prices.

Wheat continued downward to the close, ending on the lows of the day, off 1-1/2c, September \$1.45 1/4, December \$1.47 1/4. Oats were unchanged to 1c higher, September 74c, and rye was 1-1/2c higher, September \$1.04 1/4.

Minimum Wage Set For Timber Industry

NEW YORK, Sept. 1 (P)—The wage and hour division has announced that an industry committee has voted a minimum wage of 40 cents an hour for the logging, lumber, timber and related products industries.

The recommendations which are subject to a decision to be reached at a public hearing affects 550,000 employees, of whom the division estimated 85,000 were now receiving less than 40 cents per hour.

The committee was headed by George E. Osborne of Stanford University, Palo Alto, Calif., and voted the minimum without a dissenting vote.
