

FOR CHARGES DREW PEARSON CHRONIC LIAR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1 (AP)—Columnist Drew Pearson's published charge that Secretary of State Hull had an "anti-Russian attitude" brought from President Roosevelt an assertion that the writer-commentator was a chronic liar and that kind of journalism hurt the press and the nation.

Mr. Roosevelt's sharply-worded comment at a press conference yesterday brought from Pearson a prompt statement repeating his contention about Secretary Hull and adding:

"If the president needed a scapegoat, I am glad if anything I have said now forces the administration to make clear in words what certainly was not clear before in deeds."

Hull had called the column in question "monstrous and diabolical."

"The Russians were fully aware of Mr. Hull's long and consistent Russian attitude. It didn't take me to tell them about it," Pearson observed.

The president didn't mention Pearson by name but remarked he was as disturbed as Hull had been by the comments of a columnist which were very detrimental to the United States and to the unity of the United Nations, and therefore to the winning of the war.

Mr. Roosevelt added that the comments were a lie and they demonstrated bad faith with the country.

Pearson's statement after the press conference declared that he was complimented "to join the long list of newspapermen whom the president has attacked."

Klamath's Prosperity Rests With Our Timber Industry

The well-being of Klamath Falls depends, in great measure, on our timber industry. Our structure here may be said to rest on a wooden foundation—the products of our great forests. No substitute can fully take its place. If we weaken the foundation, the whole structure becomes insecure.

Every man and woman in this city has a keen interest in the forest dollar. It is a payroll dollar. A large part of our industrial payroll depends on the forests. Experts estimate that 80 cents out of every forest dollar goes into general circulation for wages, supplies and equipment. So this flow of wealth, coming from the sale of forest crops, has an important bearing on our prosperity. It is shared alike by merchant, banker, lawyer, workman and farmer.

If we would give thought to our welfare, the forest crop must be handled wisely. Fires must

be kept out of the mature timber and the young growth which is the hope of the future. Idle cut-over forest acres must be put to work producing new crops. Thus can we continue the flow of forest dollars for all of our citizens.

These are some of the reasons why the American Legion has been interested in promoting the Stop Forest Fires campaign. We want to do our part, as good American citizens, to protect our forest wealth, and to Keep Oregon Green.

Europe Guesses at Ciano's Whereabouts

LONDON, Sept. 1 (AP)—A good part of Europe joined the guessing game today over the whereabouts of Count Galeazzo Ciano, former Italian foreign minister and son-in-law of Benito Mussolini who apparently has escaped from house arrest at his home in Rome.

He was variously reported arrested near the French frontier,

hiding in the Spanish embassy in Rome, and at Innsbruck in Germany.

At least two reports had Ciano at Innsbruck. A Reuter dispatch from the Italian frontier said the latest word was that he had gotten over the border "with the assistance of foreign friends" and that his escape was causing great indignation throughout Italy. This coincided with the German underground radio Atlantic report, which said Ciano was at Innsbruck.

Former Washington Governor Divorced, Cash Settlement

SPOKANE, Sept. 1 (AP)—Mrs. Margaret Martin, married 36 years to former Gov. Clarence D. Martin, has an interlocutory divorce decree and a \$200,000 cash settlement.

In court proceedings lasting less than five minutes yesterday, the decree was granted and the settlement approved by Judge Ralph Foley, who was appointed to the bench by Governor Martin. The sum of \$200,000 was to be paid upon signing of the decree, and the remainder in quarterly payments bearing 2 1/2 percent interest.

The former governor did not appear but an answer to Mrs. Martin's suit was filed yesterday, in which he admitted he had not always informed his wife of his whereabouts.

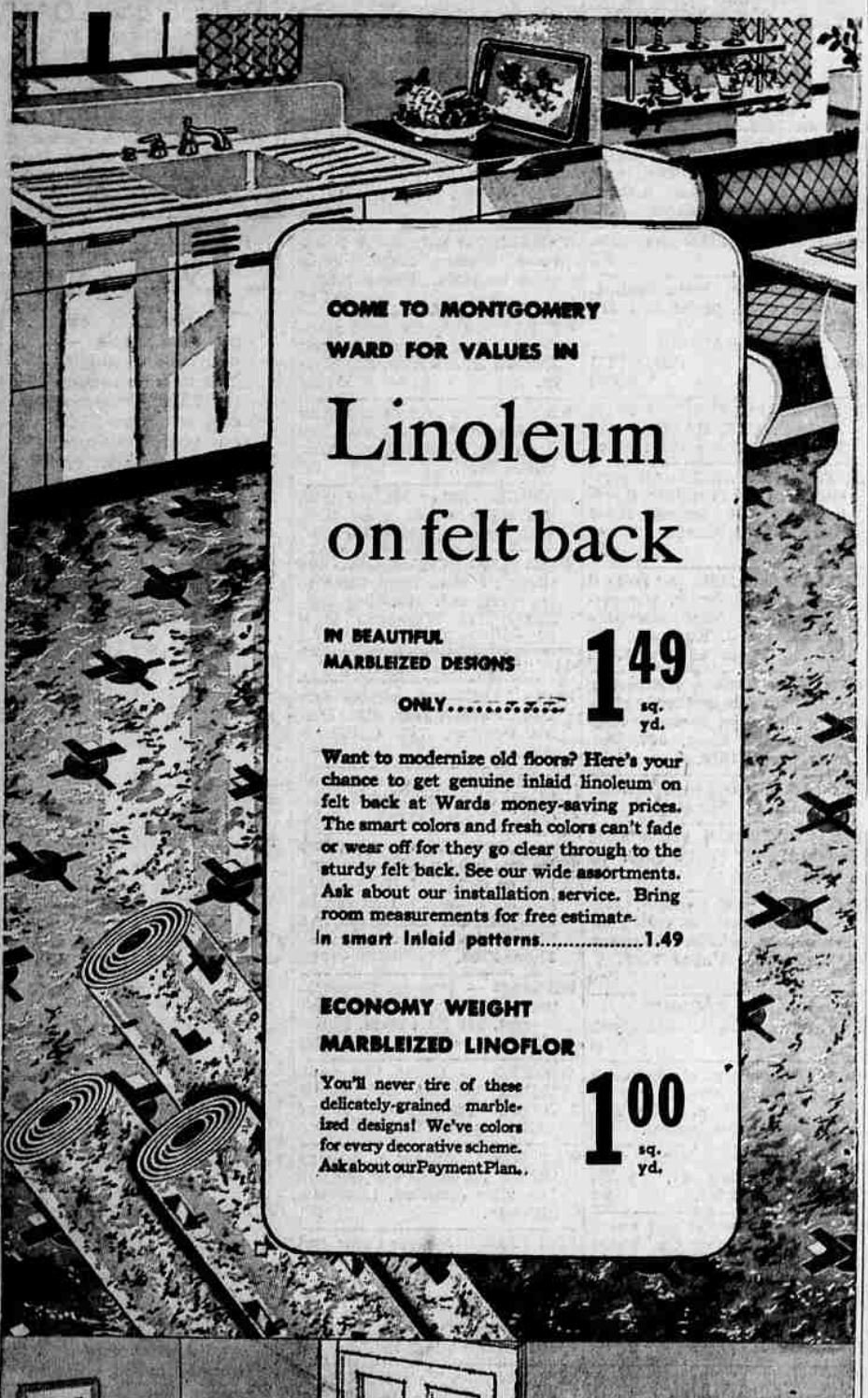
