

SPUD SHIPPING ONE DAY LATE IN MALIN AREA

MALIN—Shipment of early harvested Netted Gem potatoes from Malin is one day late this year, according to Bob Thompson, GN agent who for several years has sent the first car out on August 31. First to be shipped this season will go today from fields grown by Laddie and Bill Rajnus.

Digging started Saturday on the Dave Lagan place on the state line, the tubers being shipped south by Enos Moser, Hatfield.

Four new potato storage cellars are under construction on the GN right of way. Dalton and Evans will complete a dual purpose building this week, with storage space on the first floor and sorting shed in the second story. A carload of sorted potatoes will be put out every 35 minutes by 17 men with the new equipment. Dalton and Evans have raised a large acreage of potatoes in the Adams Point and Malin communities.

Liskey brothers have a cellar with 150 by 50 feet floor space nearly completed. Jerry Rajnus has one of the same proportions that will be completed in time for storing, and P. G. Wilson also has one under construction.

MISSING USUALLY RETURN, SAYS FLIER

SALEM, Sept. 1 (AP)—A big percentage of American airmen who are reported missing in action show up later unharmed or only slightly wounded, Capt. Wilmer E. McDowell, at home here on furlough after a year of aerial warfare in India and China, said today.

He said many fliers shot down over enemy territory have returned to their bases.

McDowell considers himself lucky to have escaped injury in 70 bombing missions, including raids on Canton, Haifong and Hongkong.

He denied reports that Japanese deliberately sacrifice themselves in the air, although he said he has seen some instances where a wounded Japanese will try to ram an American plane.
