

NAZIS PUSHED BACK ALONG ENTIRE FRONT

miles east of the important rail junction of Slavayansk. Donets River Point The Donets river point of Slavayanosovk also fell to the Russians, along with several other towns in the region, indicating that the break through was at least 30 miles across. In the Smolensk region the Russians advanced four to six miles and captured over 100 populated places, the communiques said.

Other red army forces attacking from the coast of the Sea of Azov captured the town of Budennovka, Moscow, reported.

Fourth Order The special order was the fourth to be issued by Premier Joseph Stalin in four days as the Russians rolled the German forces back along the 600-mile front from the Smolensk-Moscow road to the shores of the Sea of Azov.

The capture of Sumy, a vital rail center, carried the red army within 185 miles of Kiev in its westward drive across the northern Ukraine.

Renamed Troop The special order, broadcast by the Moscow radio and recorded here by the soviet monitor, said the Russian divisions involved in the fighting for the liberation of Sumy would be called Sumy divisions hereafter "to commemorate the success."

"For the excellent military operations and valor I express my gratitude to all troops which participated in the fighting for the liberation of Sumy, Stalin's order said.

The newest gain in the dead center of the sagging Nazi front widened and deepened the Russian by-pass salient north of Poltava, heightening the flanking hazard to the Germans in the Stalino bulge of the southern Ukraine and strengthening the Russian arc being drawn around Bryansk from the south.

The victory touched off another 124-gun salute in the soviet capital where thundering salvos have signalled the quickening cadence of German reverses since August 5, when Orel and Belgorod fell, and on through successive victories at Kharkov, Izium, Sevsk, Rysk, Taganrog, Yelnya and Dorogobuzh.

The Germans, by their own admission, were hastily withdrawing today from their once strong Donets basin salient in southern Russia presumably in fear of an even greater debacle than the one at Taganrog which the Russians say, cost them 41,000 troops.

radios, etc. are implements of the STATE. They say what they are TOLD TO SAY. Heat put on Turkey by a Russian magazine is heat put on by the RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT.

ONE guesses that Turkey is being told more or less bluntly to get in and do her part against the Germans or KISS THE DARDANELLES GOOD-BYE.

A SWEDISH correspondent in Berlin says today in a dispatch in his paper in Stockholm that the Germans sent up nearly 1400 night fighter planes against the British bombers Tuesday night—but FAILED to stop them, as even the Germans, he says, admit that at least 350 bombers got through and did heavy damage to the German capital.

That must have been at least two German fighter planes assigned to handle EACH British bomber. It gives an idea of the effort the Germans are making to break up our air assault on Germany.

THE Jap radio says today we attacked Marcus Island with at least two carriers from which we sent 90 fighters and 70 carrier bombers which did some damage to their grounded planes on the island.

After our burst of frankness yesterday, we KEEP SILENT TODAY. The only safe guess is that something is in the wind—what, we don't know. Maybe Marcus Island is a fake play designed to cover up something else.

THE German radio says the allies are massing vast invasion armadas in Britain and the Mediterranean for a two-directional assault on the continent that may be sprung at any moment. Add this to the Berlin radio report that German troops are being pulled out of the Russian front to meet an expected invasion drive from the west.

What are the German propagandists driving at? It's hard to say—but they AREN'T seeking to give US helpful and accurate information.

AMERICAN casualty totals given out today place the dead in all services—army, navy, marines, coast guard and merchant marine—in more than a year and a half of war at 19,863. Without in any way minimizing this loss of life in war, it is at least enlightening to recall that it is about HALF of our annual pre-war death toll in automobile accidents.

eliminate the virtually surrounded Japanese at that point.

Out of the mountains and along the south bank of the Francisco river, hard bitten Australians have reached a point within two miles, possibly less, of the river's mouth. The river flows south of the long-south airdrome into Bayern bay.

Try to Hold North of the river, considerable activity indicated that the Japanese, after the first shock of finding the allies driving in from above as well as below the airstrip, now are making a determined effort to hold positions. The Japanese are reported making small local counterattacks in that sector against Australians entrenched on Kila ridge.

In the Solomons, there was some basis for believing the Japanese, emulating their garrison which pulled out of Kiska in the Aleutians, have evacuated Santa Isabel island, with its seaplane base at Rekata bay. Liberator pilots returning from a raid Monday on that base northeast of New Georgia reported that for the first time no anti-aircraft fire was encountered.

Santa Isabel has been outflanked by American occupation of both New Georgia and Vella Lavella islands. But there was no indication of Japanese intention to yield Kolombangara, now sandwiched between those two occupational forces. Today's communique reported destruction by American PT boats and planes of barges and small supply boats between Vella Lavella and Kolombangara.

FDR, Churchill Talk War Politics; Russian Conference

Quebec late yesterday, accompanied by Mrs. Churchill and his staff. The only function immediately announced for his entertainment was an informal family dinner at the White House last night.

Talk Till 1 A. M. After dinner, Mr. Roosevelt and his guest talked in the president's study until 1 a. m. this morning and the president left most of his work day free for further conferences.

Presidential Secretary Stephen Early said that regular routine had been discarded so that the president and prime minister could talk whenever they feel like it.

Two Appointments Mr. Roosevelt had only two appointments today, with Brazil's war minister, General Eurico Gaspar Dutra at noon and with his cabinet at 2 p. m.

Churchill had an appointment with General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, around noon, and was seeing British military leaders and chiefs of British missions in this country after lunch.

White House officials stressed that the visit should not be considered as of a purely business nature since Mr. Roosevelt hoped to make it partly social. They also described the talks as representing not the beginning of a story but the conclusion of one begun in Canada.

Gas Applications To Be Filed Before Expiration Date

All applications for new gasoline books must be filed two weeks before the old books expire, the war price and rationing board warned today. With the limited help available for making out the books, they cannot be sent out before this time.

The board again stressed that tire inspection records must accompany all applications. If they are not sent in, the application will be returned to the applicant and an additional one to two weeks will be needed to fill out the application.

quarters, but this work will not be done until December.

Present construction, he said, includes barracks for the military, fences and roads. Segregation of "loyal" and "disloyal" Japanese in the 10 WRA centers is now in its first stages. The loyal evacuees at Newell will go elsewhere, and the first trainload of 500 will move out on September 13. The first trainload bringing disloyal evacuees from other centers will arrive September 10. The additional military guards will come in this week.

Review Segregation

Best reviewed the basis of segregation, previously announced, and pointed out that not all of the so-called "disloyal" evacuees to be at Newell will be necessarily disloyal to this country. He said there will be a good many young people, born in this country and with American ideas, held in the camp by family ties.

In general, the Newell director segregated evacuees on the basis of:

- 1. Those who look to the United States for their future.
- 2. Those who look to Japan for their future.

Gripsholm Sails To Meet Jap Exchange Ship

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—The liner Gripsholm sailed today to meet a Japanese exchange ship and return to America about 1250 United States citizens interned in Japan, China and the Philippines since Pearl Harbor.

Carrying more than 1330 Japanese civilians and tons of supplies for American prisoners of war, the liner headed for Mormugao, Portuguese East India, to meet the Japanese exchange ship Teia Maru bearing about 1500 natives of western hemisphere countries.

The announcement, by the state and war departments, said the passenger list of returning Americans is expected to be made public about October 1.

The Gripsholm's voyage, the first since returning American officials and civilians from Japan last summer, will take the ship first to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and Montevideo, Uruguay, where another 173 Japanese will be embarked.

Proceeding eastward across the Atlantic, the Gripsholm will stop at Port Elizabeth, South Africa, for fuel and water before proceeding to her destination.

The war department said the cargo consisted of food and clothing supplied by the army and navy, medical supplies from the Red Cross, and personal packages sent to relatives—all for Japanese-held prisoners.

Land Army Uniform On Display Saturday

Marcus Island Navy Raid Poses Riddle for Japs

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (AP)—The big unanswered question in the Pacific today was whether the daring U. S. navy raid on Marcus Island in Japan's home waters was a feint or a well-aimed knockout punch.

Japan could use the answer to that riddle, right now. Three possibilities emerged from the meager accounts of the spectacular raid:

1. The carrier task force which bombed and shelled the island may have been preparing the way for occupation. It's not a big place but in United States hands it could serve as an outpost that would harry Japan's communications with the South Pacific.

2. The attack would have been a feint to cover some highly important move elsewhere, conceivably occupation of Wake Island, or a drive on the vital Japanese positions in the Kuriles.

3. The navy may have moved in for a slashing hit-run blow for its psychological effect, alone.

At any rate, the action served notice on Tokyo's admirals that the allies can hit from many directions. If worried enough by it, the Japanese might be egged into dispersing their available forces to meet all possible threats, in such manner that a vulnerable hole would be opened in their defenses.
