Mexican Laborers Problem To Store Clerks on Payday

"If I only knew a little Spanish."

This thought enters the mind of most men's store clerks when confronted on pay day by a group of Mexican farm hands, recently brought here from Mexico to help in the fields.

When all of them have a check burning a hole in their pockets and none of them, in most cases, can speak a word of English to tell the clerk what they want, things get a little complicated sometimes.

According to one of the clerks, the procedure usually goes something like this. After unsuccessfully in his native tongue trying to make his wants known, the shopper finally points to a jacket and a pair of leather gloves.

"That's easy," thinks the clerk and he smiles knowingly and brings forth a coat in the Mexican's size. But the man shakes his head and points to the leather gloves again. Oh, so it's just the gloves he wants. No, wrong again. "That wasn't it either. Doesn't he want either one?" thinks the flustered clerk. But the shopper points to the jacket and gloves again. After many more unsuccessful attempts, it finally becomes clear. The man wants a leather jacket.

That's over, but complications soon arise over the price. Even if the amount is written down, in many cases the Mexican can't read it or at least he doesn't

quite understand how much the sum amounts to, not being familiar with American money.

An interpreter in men's stores would be very helpful at times, there's no doubt about it, and at least one business man expressed a desire to get a clerk who has some knowledge of Spanish.

In some cases, however, the Mexican shopper brings his own interpreter, a man who knows some English, or sometimes, he himself can speak a few American words.
