Former Washington Secretary of State Held for Larceny

PORTLAND, Sept. 3 (AP)—Charles B. Reed, 63, ex-Washington state assistant secretary of state, was held by police since last December, was held in the city jail here Thursday for Washington authorities.

Detective Dan Mitola said Reed was arrested in a hotel last night on an Olympia, Wash., charge of grand larceny in connection with a shortage in a \$3000 fund of which Reed was trustee.

The fund had been raised to buy as historical relics the films of the late Asahel Curtis, pioneer photographer.

Mitola said Reed declared he would not waive extradition. Reed said he had been working in Portland several months, Mitola added.

Elko Out of Bounds For Wendover Army

WENDOVER, Utah, Sept. 3 (AP)—The city of Elko, Nev., 128 miles west of Wendover, was declared Thursday out of bounds for all military personnel.

Lt. A. J. Madden, public relations officer at Wendover army air base, announced the order which he said resulted from the failure of city officials of Elko to close houses of prostitution.

Many cases of venereal infection, Madden said, have been traced to Elko and city officials there were informed military men would be prevented from entering the city unless the situation were changed.

ELK HOTEL TO BE RENAMED AS 'WINEMA'

"Winema" is to be the name of the present Elk hotel when it opens under direction of new Klamath owners on September 15.

Naming the hotel for the famed Indian woman peace-maker of the Modoc war was announced Friday by the new owners, M. S. West, C. A. Dunn, A. M. Collier and T. B. Watters.

The hotel is now closed while new furnishings are being installed. The lease of a Portland hotel company, which operated the hostelry as the Elk, expired on September 1, and the new management is to be in charge of Eugene Larson, Klamath Falls.

Klamath Furniture company has the contract for installing 3000 yards of carpet.

The Klamath owners plan eventually to enlarge the lobby by making it embrace the present coffee shop room. A coffee shop will be installed in the room now occupied by a beauty shop. A dining room will be opened in the rear of the lobby.

The new name of the hotel has already been registered. Winema (Toby Riddle) acted as interpreter in the Modoc war, and urged her people to abandon the warfare undertaking that brought eventual disaster. She was present at the time of the Canby massacre, and is credited with saving lives of some of the white commissioners.

Berlin Still Aflame After Tuesday's Raid

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 3 (AP)—Swiss dispatches said Thursday 450 fires were still burning in Berlin after Tuesday night's RAF block-buster raid and that estimates of the dead ran as high as 5000.

The newspaper Allehanda reported from Bern, Switzerland, that some of the fires raging in the German capital were so large no effort was made to extinguish them, firemen merely attempting to keep them from spreading.

Allehanda said fire-fighting equipment was called to Berlin from Frankfurt-am-Oder, Stettin, Kuestrin, Dresden and Leipzig. The main force of the raid was felt in central Berlin, it was said, in the district of Stettiner Bahnhof, Alexander Platz and

Hallesches Tor, and damage was also suffered in the southeast and southwest suburbs such as Steglitz, Lichtenberg and Kottbuerger Tor.
