Ramsey's Gridders Start Scrum; Squad Shapes Up

Schortgen Looks Good at Fullback; Miller Promises Bruising Plunges

Klamath's Pelicans, with that first game with Ashland September 17 on the horizon, have gone into scrimmage this week and first squad personnel is beginning to take shape.

The Grizzlies have a new coach and not much is known here yet about their potential strength, but Coach Frank Ramsey of the Pelicans intends to

have his outfit in full season form to open the schedule a week from Friday evening. The Ashland coach is Al Simpson, former junior high mentor, who is back after a stint in the army.

Ramsey's aggregation is offensively farther along than at the same time last year, due to intensive drilling the first day of school. The lads have been doing a lot of work on blocking and tackling, and this rough play is showing up much promising material.

Hank Schortgen looms as a star at fullback. Schortgen saw a lot of activity last year as a reserve at this position. He's doing most of the passing, his punting is steadily improving, and he looks good on those short side plunges that were Don Mast's specialty in 1942.

Peterstener, at right half, and Robin, at quarter, are rapidly developing as powerful blockers. Louis Bickers, a quarterback candidate, is showing promise on the blocking line.

Vern Yank, who played tackle last year, is the 1943 utility man. Vern is a good student, he's big and tough, and doesn't care where he plays, just so he plays. He's good in the backfield, at right end, or either tackle spot.

Silva, at left half, is coming along, but has a bruise on his back that has slowed him up. Bob Perkins is a potent aspirant for left halfback position, and Don Bickers is also a worthy contender for that spot.

Among the reserves, Joe Miller, the big Indian, promises to develop into a bruising plunger for Ramsey, reminiscent of Gordon McKay of 1942 fame. Don DeMain, at quarter, is a fine blocker. Jack Smith, at right half, is fast, a good pass receiver, and is working to improve his blocking.

Jerry Hicks, fullback aspirant, is a promising sophomore. Others who are listed as backfield contenders are Jack Haney, quarter; Art Williams and Bob Lohrey, left halfback; Earl Hansen and Don Vanderhoff, right half.

In view of the huge turnout for football this year, a bigger Pelican squad than usual is to be retained. Ramsey will probably have four full eleveners. The remainder of the big football class will play Wildcat football.

The hope on Ramsey's line material will be given in another story.

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Only Six Big League Pitch Artists in 20-Game Victory Class; Cooper a Repeater

With the closing of the major league campaign less than four weeks away, the field of potential 20-game winners among the pitchers has narrowed to half a dozen men, two in the American league and four in the National.

This is a big shrinkage from

the score or more who were in the running a month ago, but it indicates what a difficult goal 20 victories is for even good pitchers with good clubs.

In 1942, the two St. Louis Stars, Morton Cooper and Rookie Johnny Beazley, won 22 and 21, respectively, in the National league while Cecil (Tex) Hughson of Boston and Ernie

Bonham of the New York Yankees won 22 and 21 in the American league.

Of this group only Cooper will be a repeater this year. He has won 19 and lost eight in the Cardinals' sweep toward another pennant. Beazley has entered the army and Bonham and Hughson have had a lackluster season, each winning 12 games to date.

Truett (Rip) Sewell of the Pittsburgh Pirates, proponent of the famed parachute pitch sometimes called the ephus (nothing) ball, already has won 20 games and lost seven. He was to go after victory No. 21 today against the Cardinals.

Elmer Riddle of the Cincinnati Reds has won 18 and lost nine and Hiram Bithorn, the Puerto Rican righthander of the Chicago Cubs, has won 17 and lost 10. Both have good prospects of hitting 20.

In the American league Spurgeon (Spud) Chandler of the Yankees is the nearest thing to a sure shot for 20 with a present record of 18 and three and Paul (Dizzy) Trout of the Detroit Tigers has won 17 and lost 10.

Trout attained his 17th triumph and fifth shutout yesterday as the Tigers took a doubleheader from the Chicago White Sox 5-0 and 6-5.

These games, the only major league action of the day, were postponed from Labor Day and drew a sparse turnout of 5862 fans. Trout had everything his own way in the opener, spacing seven hits and letting no runner get past second. Michael (Pinky) Higgins and Rudy York hit home runs, the 31st of the year for York.

The Tigers settled the second game by scoring all six of their runs in the third and fourth innings, but had to smother a three-run uprising by the Sox in the ninth to win.



Navy World Series Set For Sunday

Sailors Don't Care For Cards, Yanks as Norfolk Baseball Rivals Grow

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 8 (AP)—Don't be asking a sailor around this naval base whether he thinks the St. Louis Cardinals or the New York Yankees will win the World Series because you won't get a satisfactory answer.

These sailors are much more concerned about the navy's "World Series" which opens Sunday between the rival Norfolk naval training station and the Norfolk naval air station.

The two rivals of the navy will play a seven-game series—both clubs say it won't last beyond four contests—and from a squint at their respective rosters, you'd think they might be playing the classic which comes off every autumn between the champions of the National and American leagues.

The sailors boast such pitchers as Freddie Hutchinson of the Detroit Tigers before he joined up with Uncle Sam; Charley Wagner, Boston Red Sox, and Tom Earley, Boston Braves. Besides these, they have little Phil Rizuto, ex-Yankee shortstop; Dominic DiMaggio, Boston Red Sox

outfielder; Benny McCoy, Philadelphia Athletics second baseman; and Don Padgett, St. Louis Cardinals outfielder.

The airman may not have so many former major leaguers, but they have a pretty nifty bunch of ball players. Their No. 1 pitcher is chunky Hugh Casey, once the pride of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who hurled a no-hit, no-run game against the neighboring sailors.

Beavers Turn Roy Helser Loose On Seals, Win 4-2; Seattle Closer to Frisco

Portland helped both itself and Seattle out yesterday when it turned Roy Helser loose on the San Francisco Seals for a little revenge pitching and won a Pacific Coast league baseball game 4 to 2.

Helser, former Salem, Ore., player in the Western International league who was turned back by San Francisco, allowed only six hits and one walk. The game was played in 78 minutes, fastest time of any league game this year.

For Portland the win meant going another half game ahead of Hollywood and gripping still more firmly fourth position in the league standings—a full five tilt margin with only the rest of the week to go.

The loss dropped San Francisco a little nearer third-place Seattle, leaving the Seals six games ahead. It was the only scheduled game of the day.

The full league starts play today with Los Angeles at Seattle and San Francisco at Portland squaring off in twilight games; San Diego meeting Hollywood in an afternoon game, and Sacramento playing Oakland in the only double header of the day.

The Rainiers took the day off to pick their all-opponent Coast league team and name four players from the league-leading Los Angeles squad. They were Pitcher Jimmy Lynn, Catcher Billy Holm, Rightfielder Andy Pafko and Roy Hughes, on second base.

They chose George Metkovich, who played with San Francisco before going up to the Boston Red Sox, as the best outfielder in the league this season.

Others on the all-opponent team were: first base, Larry Barton, Portland; third, Harry Clements, Hollywood; shortstop, Mickey Burnett, Sacramento; left field, John Dickshot, Hollywood; center field, Frenchy Uhalt, San Francisco; southpaw pitcher, Al Brazier of Sacramento, who was called up by the St. Louis Cards in mid-season.

The California athletic commission refused yesterday to allow him to go through with his contract to fight Luther (Sluggo) White, Baltimore negro, in Hollywood September 18.

Armstrong told the commission he was willing to fulfill his contract, but Chairman Jules Covey, A. P. Entenza and Everett Sanders had decided he might risk permanent injury.

"If that's the case, I'm through with the ring," said the little Los Angeles negro, who once held the feather, light and welter titles simultaneously. "I'm quitting, but not because of any trouble right now with my eyes. I'm just tired of fighting."

Armstrong, now 32, has been fighting for 12 years.
