these things much clearer to us outsiders.

**THE** big point is that Italy has folded up. Added to this is the intriguing suggestion that once they get the German hand away from their throats the Italians might even fight with us AGAINST THE GERMANS. Our planes are now roaring over Italy, dropping leaflets instead of bombs, and the leaflets point out that now is the time for the Italians to "take vengeance on the HATED GERMANS."

**ANOTHER** interesting disclosure is that the armistice terms were agreed to by Britain, the United States and RUSSIA. In a military way, you see, we're WORKING WITH RUSSIA, in apparently rather close harmony.

**THE** Italian fold-up is a hard jolt for Germany, which had hoped to make Italy a battleground OUTSIDE Germany. With Italy in our possession, we can bomb Germany hard from the south as well as from the west.

**ANOTHER** important point: The Italian surrender will be likely to precipitate a rush for the allied band-wagon on the part of the German satellite nations (in the Balkans and elsewhere) and the remaining neutral nations.

**Argentina**, as you will note from today's dispatches, has already STARTED this band-wagon rush by asking us for lend-lease materials (including implements of war).

**Argentina**, who BET ON THE WRONG HORSE, is now worried about Brazil, who bet on the right horse. You may be sure that all the other neutrals that leaned toward Germany when Germany was going great guns are worried in the same way now that the tide has turned.

**ONE** other point today: The news is GREAT. But let's NOT let up in our war efforts—including bond buying.

With ultimate victory CERTAIN, as General Marshall tells us, let's wade in HARDER THAN EVER in order to wind it up as quickly as possible, thus saving as many lives as possible. Let's not be the kind of football team that lets down in its efforts when it reaches its opponent's 30-yard line. Games CAN be lost that way.

## PURCHASE OF PARK LAND HAS COUNCIL OKAY

An ordinance for the purchase of two additional tracts of ground at Westover terraces for the Memorial Park cemetery passed its third and final reading Tuesday night at a meeting of the city council.

The ordinance was passed following a recommendation by the bond committee that \$15,000 be taken from the city property fund for the purchase of the land.

Approval was given to the monthly reports of the various city departments which were as follows:

Police department—Bails and fines, \$2129.90. Arrests, 321.

Juvenile office—Interviews, 113. Investigations, 13. Junior police, 3. Meetings, 3.

Fire department—Value of property at risk, \$4680. Actual loss, \$2201.85.

A letter to the council from the Bonneville administration of the U. S. department of interior, saying that the administration was interested in completing an industrial and economic survey in Klamath county was read.

The communication said that it was hoped that the survey could be completed by the end of this year.

City Engineer E. A. Thomas asked council approval on the purchase of a second-hand pickup which he said the city needed very badly. Thomas said that he had picked out one, which he thought was in good condition and which would cost the city \$600. The city engineer was given the authority to make the purchase.
