

Third War Loan Drive Opens Officially on Thursday

CAMPAIGN OFF TO GOOD START, BUT QUOTA BIG

The Third War Loan drive in Klamath county opens officially tomorrow, with the campaign organization complete and Klamath county people already displaying strong support of this effort to raise the largest bond quota of the war.

Bond purchases beginning September 1 have counted on the quota of \$2,518,000, but it is expected that the real buying of bonds will start with the official opening of the drive. Nearly a million dollars in E bonds have been asked of Klamath county by the state headquarters and the treasury department, with the remainder to be made up of larger bonds, tax certificates, etc.

Bond headquarters are open at 313 Main street, with Mrs. Claude Davis in charge of the office. E. B. Hall, general chairman of the campaign, is devoting virtually all of his time to the drive, which is being led this month by the Klamath Falls Elks lodge.

Yesterday kits for agricultural committee workers throughout the county were mailed to the various chairmen by Mrs. Ed Geary and Mrs. Davis.

Several labor organization heads met Tuesday night and indicated strong support of the bond drive, with purchases to be made by organizations along with the individuals. Considerable success attended the effort to get industrial workers to put retroactive pay into bonds, and more purchases from this source are anticipated.

The chain store group under C. S. Elliot has raised a fund to be used in bond sale promotion.

Dick Reeder, in charge of the drive amid general downtown businesses, has announced the following sub-committees: Ladies' wear, Larry Whyatt; men's wear, Rudy Jacobs; hardware, gifts, etc., Mrs. Effie Garcelon; groceries, Roy Carter; cleaners, Homer Ellis and Hans Norland; shoes, Eddie Goekner. New committee assignments announced by Hall include: barbers, Don Wells; hotels, R. D. Eller; machine shops, Elmer Balisger; drug stores, Nick Long; pool rooms, Carl Steinseifer and R. C. Woodruff.

The special events committee is working on radio programs, the Grants Pass high football game plan, and various other schemes, with John Houston in charge. A special "Finish That Book" campaign has been arranged by the education committee.

Various municipal corporation boards, including the city, county and school districts, are expected to act within a few days on buying bonds out of reserve funds. John Reber heads this committee.

Klamath Indians are expected to come through with a substantial purchase. Railroad workers are buying bonds with Frank Peyton heading this section of the drive.

This is a partial picture of the Third War Loan activity, but Hall pointed out that the organization of the drive is not the real story. The story, he said, will be told by the response of Klamath people, for they must buy the bonds which make the quota and uphold the remarkable bond record of the county.

Oregon Prohibition Party Starts Again

PORTLAND, Sept. 8 (P)—The Oregon prohibition party, defunct since passage of the 18th amendment, will be reorganized at a state convention here September 17, W. M. Heacock, temporary chairman, said today.

Signatures of 13,822 Oregon voters will be sought to place a party ticket on the 1944 ballot, Heacock said.

Edward E. Blake, Chicago, chairman of the prohibition national committee, will be the principal speaker at the convention.

BOND CHIEFS URGE MAXIMUM BUYING BY ALL

Klamath county can make its Third War Loan quota only through the maximum buying effort of every individual in the county, it was pointed out today by A. M. Collier and J. V. Owens, chairman and vice-chairman of the county war savings committee.

"This drive is no pushover," said a statement from the two leaders.

"We will never make it if people sit back and expect the big purchasers to do the job. We will never make it unless there is county-wide support, with every individual, every firm and every group investing every possible penny in bonds in September."

"The war savings committee is especially gratified that the Klamath lodge of Elks accepted leadership of this difficult campaign." In Klamath county, we have had grand success with the plan of having different organizations lead the bond drives. An interesting thing about this is that once one group takes hold of the leadership, the others swing in with support, realizing the burden assumed. This is a demonstration of real Klamath sportsmanship, and we note with pleasure that the Elks are receiving such support.

"The Elks, of course, can't do it alone. The average purchase for every man, woman and child in Klamath county in this drive must reach more than \$60. The average purchase for every earner must more than double that. It's a big job. But we haven't failed yet. We won't fail this time."

ROME SUBURBS HIT BY ALLIED BOMBS

LONDON, Sept. 8 (P)—The Rome radio said today that Frascati and other localities in the suburbs of Rome were heavily bombed at noon today by allied planes.

A broadcast recorded by The Associated Press said the towns of Colonna, Grottoferata, Lanuvio and Velletri, all on a railroad circling Monti Albani, which dominates the Italian capital, were also bombed and strafed.

The greatest damage was done, however, the broadcast added, at Frascati by "enemy planes which swept over the town in waves exactly at noon."

The town was described as a favorite summer resort for the population of Rome.
