Argentina Minister Quits; U. S. Embassy Under Police Guard

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with the authorization of President Ramirez, some cabinet members apparently regarded the note as ill advised and ineptly phrased.

The pro-axis newspaper Pampero went so far as to assert that it was evident the government contained a representative who failed to express Argentina's sentiments.

Storni's Beliefs
Since taking office as foreign minister in the Ramirez government, which overthrew the regime of Ramon Castillo in a coup d'etat on June 4, Storni had made it evident that he personally believed Argentina's place was at the side of the other American republics and that severance of relations with the axis would be a normal development.

(The state department in Washington had no comment to make last night on Storni's resignation, but some diplomats in the capital expressed doubt whether the Ramirez government could weather the situation which precipitated his action.)

Fewer pears will be stored-in-transit in Klamath Falls this year than has been customary for a number of years, due to a reduction in the Rogue valley pear crop, it was learned Friday.

It was reported the Rogue crop is 60 to 70 per cent of normal this year and recent estimates have shown continuing decline.

Pears from the Rogue valley are stored at the local plant of the Klamath Ice and Storage company. About half of the usual volume is anticipated there this year.

COOL AUGUST REPORTED BY WEATHERMAN

August was a little cooler than usual, according to reports made this week by the weatherman. The mean temperature for the month was 64.8 degrees, compared with 66.9 degrees, the mean for all years.

The maximum temperature was reached on August 13, while the minimum was registered on August 30, when 33 degrees was recorded at the station. The mercury obviously dropped below this point in outlying areas as frost damage was more or less general.

Precipitation was short of normal, with only .03 inches recorded. The normal for August over a 52-year period is .25 inches. Precipitation for the stream year to August 31 is 17.88 inches, compared to a normal of 12.52 inches.

REPORTS ASKED ON VIOLATIONS OF WAGE RATES

Violations in the established farm wage rates should be immediately reported by growers or others to the Tulelake Growers or the Klamath Potato Growers association, Chester Main, president of the Tulelake association, and Henry Semon, president of the Klamath association, stated today.

Information received by these associations from the National War Labor board requests that all violations be immediately reported to the office of the war labor board in Seattle, in order that those who follow wage stabilization regulations will not suffer a disadvantage in the harvesting and marketing of their crops.

The wage rates apply not only to the harvesting of potatoes, but to the grading and sorting as well, and all commercial sorters are covered by the regulation.

Rates established for the Klamath county farm labor committee are: Four cents per 60 pounds for picking potatoes, \$1 per hour for all other work in connection with the harvest. These rates should not be exceeded and the scale should be adhered to throughout the area.
