YOUNG PEOPLE TO HAVE COMMUNION

On Sunday evening at 7 o'clock, the young people's communion service will be held at the First Presbyterian church. This is an annual affair of long standing in which the congregation seeks to honor the young people going away to college. The parents, friends and all interested young people, as well as older people, are cordially invited to this high and holy service. Mrs. E. S. Veatch will be at the console of the organ and Miss Lillie E. Darby, director of the choir, will lead those present in singing a series of old-time communion songs.

The general public will be welcomed. The time is that of the usual hour of the Christian Endeavor meetings, at which the communion is served.

News of the Commandos

The weekends at the Center surely have been busy and interesting during the maneuvers of the army near Bend, Ore. These soldiers have sincerely appreciated Klamath Falls hospitality. It has been practically two months since any of them have been in a town, had showers or baths, unless they came to a creek someplace on the maneuver grounds. The army made arrangements to send groups of these men to Klamath Falls for a few hours of entertainment. It meant bringing these men approximately 150 miles in trucks, which often would leave at 3 a. m., arriving here many hours later. The men would be tired and dirty and many would drop into the Center, sit on aavenport or chair and fall asleep. Other soldiers that have visited in Klamath during this maneuver period would obtain a three day pass, hitch hike to Bend and then either get on a bus or hitch hike here.

We have had so many requests regarding available rooms. During the past few weeks many have not been able to get a hotel room, because the hotels have been running to capacity on weekends. The Commandos would like to have a list of private rooms in local homes, within walking distance of town, which they could keep on a permanent file. We would only use this list at times when the hotels could not accommodate the heavy influx of soldiers. Many soldiers would be willing to pay for a room in a private home. However, we would like to state at this time we would not be able to choose or be responsible for the man sent to any home. These men are all strangers to you, the same as they would be to you. We do feel, however, that many people in Klamath Falls would be pleased to have a soldier in their home at times when the hotels are full and cannot accommodate the men. Should you want to list your room, please call the Commando Center at 9103.

It has been interesting to us to meet soldiers in so many different divisions. There are many thousands of soldiers on maneuvers and from many different camps. The tank destroyer division perhaps had the greatest number here. There were others from the Timber Wolves, the Water Battalion—these men purify the water and go in with the engineers, and many from the medical corps at Camp White.

Mrs. George C. Burger, who entertained two wounded sailors, Floyd Colglazier and Wayne Fogelstrom, in March, has just returned to Klamath Falls from California. Mrs. Burger had dinner with Floyd Colglazier and his mother, Mrs. Alma Colglazier, one evening this summer.

A great many people will remember Floyd. He was a pharmacist mate on the Hornet when it was sunk. Since then Floyd has received the Purple Heart for bravery in action. Mrs. Burger told us how much Mrs. Colglazier appreciated our bringing her son to Klamath Falls last March. While here Floyd acted as speaker for the four sailors. He made talks at civic clubs and at the Elks club. It is interesting to learn that he has been doing considerable radio work and speaking, even though he isn't yet released from the naval hospital. He has appeared on Warner Brothers programs—and is still doing his part for his country.

We had many donations of food brought into the Center this week. We want to thank each person who was so kind. Mrs. A. V. Lepley, whose son, Milo, is now overseas has brought two

dozen eggs each Saturday for several months. Mrs. Lepley was one of our very first contributors. Mrs. Spencer and Mrs. Brannon each brought in two dozen eggs. Gus Lamprolos, of the Olympia grocery, brought in a lug of pears. Mason Ehrman donated us a case of coffee. Mrs. George Adler and Mrs. McCullough each brought in home made cakes. We would like to say now that there is hardly a weekend in which Mrs. Adler doesn't bring in a cake, pie, or a delicious, mixed sandwich spread. Mrs. Myrtle Ellingson brought down two baked meat loaves to be used in making sandwiches for the soldiers. Mrs. Martin Olson gave us \$1.00 for cookies. These home-made cakes, meat loaves, etc., surely add much to the variation of food we can serve.

We have a box in the Center, and whoever is on duty and received any donation is supposed to put the name of the donor in the box. This week we found this little note from a soldier in the box. We all got a chuckle out of it so we will pass it on to you:

"I, Sgt. Ross J. Morgan, in sound mind hereby suggest that the Klamath Commando be allowed to go on dates with soldiers in their Commando uniforms.
