## 50 TULELAKE WOMEN EARN SERVICE PINS

TULELAKE — Red Cross activities in the Tulelake chapter rolled along with usual momentum in August, it was revealed at the meeting for monthly reports this week. Fifty women who have put in 50 hours of work are now eligible for service pins.

Colonel Verne Austin, commanding officer at Camp Newell, and Captain C. W. Maples outlined needs of furnishings for recreation rooms that will be completed this fall in the new military unit. Five rooms will need chairs, lounges, lamps and other furniture and it is hoped that another piano may be obtained.

Young people of the community plan to sponsor one room. The chapter has also been asked to establish an employment bureau for serving wives of soldiers who are coming into the community. The problem of housing these families is an acute one and it is expected that many of them will be available for housework as well as for clerical positions. Between 200 and 300 are expected and Mrs. George Yost, home service chairman of the chapter will be assisted by Ralph Fausett in placing the newcomers or in finding living accommodations for them. Mrs. French E. Johnson, chairman of the local USO unit, and her assistants, Mrs. J. C. Stevenson Jr., and Mrs. Ralph Ganger are also working on the same problem.

Other guest speakers at the meeting were Mr. Turner, Yreka, Siskiyou county Red Cross chairman, Mrs. Butler, vice chairman of the county unit, Mrs. Healey and Mrs. M. V. Maxwell.

Fifty women working 33 1/2 hours and four instructors working 78 1/2 hours completed 4823 surgical dressings last month. One entire afternoon was devoted to cutting. Workers in the future will make 2x2 dressings instead of 4x4.

Three sweaters, one helmet and one pair of gloves were knitted last month and several convalescent robes are being made. The Winema club donated \$5.
