lique described this drive as in the Nezhin sector, half way between Kiev and Bakhmach.

North of Bryansk advances of from three to six miles were recorded and more than 80 inhabited places overrun in the swift drive. Several places also were captured south of Bryansk. Southwest of Kharkov where advances of three to five miles were scored, and toward Smolensk.

The soviet war bulletin said that during the day 46 nazi tanks were destroyed or disabled and 49 enemy planes shot down.

**MOSCOW, Sept. 11 (P)**—Battering the fleeing German legions along a 400-mile front from the Sea of Azov to Bryansk at the northern end of the Ukraine, red army troops have imperiled the entire nazi defense system east of the Dnieper river and are threatening the sole remaining escape corridor of the Crimean garrisons.

Sledge-hammer Russian blows reported today turned the German retreat in many places into a rout. The enemy abandoned vast stores of material as they gave up more than 300 towns and villages. Upwards of 8800 German officers and men were slain on the various sectors, said the daily soviet communique.

#### Mariupol Taken

Mariupol, important port on the Sea of Azov, and Chaplino, rail junction 60 miles from Dnepropetrovsk—both strategic German strongpoints in the southern Ukraine—were stormed and taken by soviet forces.

Russian naval forces from the Sea of Azov and air-borne troops participated in the capture of Mariupol.

(Berlin acknowledged the unceasing Russian advance. A commentator on the German radio said the red army pressure was continuous and that the German withdrawal "was still going on and not likely to stop for some time. Very grim fighting is in progress".)

**LONDON, Sept. 11 (P)**—The German high command in a broadcast communique today said the red army had made a large-scale landing attempt in the Novorossisk area where the Germans still hold a small bridgehead in the Caucasus and that fighting still was going on as German forces attempted to wipe out the landing parties.

## FIFTH ARMY THROWS BACK NAZI ATTACKS

this area. Salerno (pop. 50,000) is one of the larger provincial cities of southern Italy.

Headquarters aerial reports said allied planes attacked German convoys moving northward toward the Naples-Salerno districts, indicating a German withdrawal from areas farther south, to escape possible entrapment and throw greater weight against the fifth army bridgehead.

#### Stiff Fight

U. S. units of the fifth army bore the brunt of the German resistance during landings at Salerno, and stiff fighting raged on the beaches. Five nazi counter-blows were blunted on Thursday.

British units encountered comparatively little resistance in their landings some distance away, but later were attacked by German tanks which they repulsed.

"Steady progress" has been made by the invaders since the start of the campaign, it was announced.

Naval guns supported ground troops at Salerno. The bridgehead is now firmly established, headquarters declared.

#### Little Fight

Meanwhile in the south the British eighth army met little opposition and despite demolitions went ahead more rapidly, now holding practically all the territory south of the bottleneck formed by the Gulf of Squillace and the Gulf of Sant'Eufemia.

This forms practically all the toe of Italy.

(NBC Correspondent Merrill Mueller on a broadcast said the eighth army had advanced 35 miles northward at such a pace that it is beginning to overtake the retreating Germans.)

#### Occupied Taranto

The British force at Taranto completed occupation of that naval base and town. Most of the Germans were reported to have evacuated the city before the landing, and the population was said to have cheered the British.

(Radio France at Algiers said the British were fanning out in three directions from Taranto.)

Italians did not oppose a small allied force landing on the island of Ventotene off Naples, but the Germans there surrendered only after a fierce fight, and 61 were captured.

#### Advantages

Headquarters said the Germans had many natural advantages over the attackers in the Naples area landings, and were prepared to meet the invasion which they had fully anticipated.

(Allied headquarters gave no detailed disposition of the Italian fleet, but a Reuters dispatch to London from Malta reported four battleships, seven cruisers and six destroyers reached Valletta harbor in Malta last night. Two cruisers, two destroyers and two smaller units had reached Gibraltar.

#### Put in at Spain

(Barcelona dispatches from Palma de Mallorca said 12 Italian naval units had arrived at that Spanish port in the Balearic Islands.)

(The German communique declared that the Italian naval base of Pola on the Yugoslav shore of the Adriatic sea, and the islands of Rhodes in the Dodecanese had surrendered to the Germans.

("Our troops have marched into Milan, Turin and Padua," it said, while a broadcast of the German News agency trans-ocean reported "the major part of the Italian peninsula is under the control of German armed forces." German headquarters said a counter-attack had regained some ground in bitter fighting in the Salerno area.

#### Annual Treaty

(A British broadcast heard by CBS said Berlin had announced annulment of Croatia's treaty with Italy guaranteeing Croatia's independence, and cancellation of the offer of the Croat crown to the Italian prince of Aosta. It added the Zagreb radio had appealed to Croats "to support the Germans in their struggle against the Italians.")

The Germans were throwing more aviation into the battle of Italy, and attempted to bomb the fifth army troops.

There was no official information here about conditions in Italy other than allied-occupied areas, but broadcasts from Germany and other European countries formed a fantastic picture of the situation.

By these accounts, the Germans are installed solidly in northern and central Italy, with Milan and Rome surrendered to them after battle with the Italians.

Civilians must learn not to talk. No amount of remorse over careless words thoughtlessly uttered can restore a single life lost because the enemy was tipped off.—Maj. Albert Stowe of Army's military intelligence section.

Brown Stamps: A valid Sept. 12; B valid Sept. 19. Expire Oct. 2. C becomes valid Sept. 26; D on Oct. 3; E on Oct. 10; and F on Oct. 17. Expire Oct. 30.

#### PROCESSED FOOD

September 20—Blue stamps R-S-T expire. Stamps U-V-W valid Sept. 1 to Oct. 20.

#### SUGAR

October 31—Stamp number 14 in book 1 valid for 5 pounds until this date. Stamps number 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning purposes only, expire.

#### GASOLINE

September 21—No. 7 stamps in A book, each good for four gallons, valid through this date.

#### SHOES

October 31—Stamp No. 18, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

#### FUEL OIL

September 30—Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rationals valid through January 3, 1944. One unit, period 5 coupons valid through September 30 for 10 gallons. #### STOVES

August 24—Beginning date of cooking and heating stove rationing. Covering all new stoves burning coal, wood, oil or gas for domestic use, with a few exceptions.

"C" book holders must have tires inspected every three months with at least 45 days elapsing between inspections.

"B" book holders must have tires inspected every four months with at least 60 days elapsing between inspections.

"A" and "D" book holders must have tires inspected every six months with at least 90 days elapsing between inspections.

## BATTLESHIPS, CRUISERS RUN TO MALTA BASE

Doria and the Giulio Cesare, both ancient 23,622-ton warships which were reconstructed and modernized in 1937. Each carries ten 12-inch guns as its main armament.

#### Others at Malta

Two other battleships reported to have reached Malta today, along with nine cruisers, six destroyers and smaller units, were not identified.

Two Italian cruisers, two destroyers and two smaller units were reported to have reached the British base at Gibraltar yesterday, while a dispatch today from the neutral Spanish port of Palma de Mallorca in the Balearics told of the arrival there of 12 units of the Italian fleet.

#### Doubt Cast

An Associated Press dispatch from La Linea, Spain, however, cast doubt today on the reported arrivals at Gibraltar. Eyewitnesses said there were no Italian vessels in Gibraltar bay today.

Despite severe losses the latest accounts indicated that in addition to her battleships and cruisers Italy had three aircraft carriers, 25 destroyers, 50 to 60 submarines and a large number of smaller craft.

Losses to the Italian fleet during the war include five heavy and seven light cruisers, 35 destroyers and large torpedo boats, a large number of submarines and light craft.

On entering the war, Italy had a merchant navy exceeding two million tons in the Mediterranean. Acquisitions from the French and new construction added a million tons to this.

Ferry service to Africa, however, was hard hit by allied naval and air attacks and about half of the total is believed to be at the bottom of the sea.

Italy at the present time is believed to have about 370 merchant ships of 1,500,000 total gross tonnage, including 60 passenger vessels, 250 freighters and 60 tankers.

**ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Sept. 11 (P)**—Soon after escaping from German-dominated ports in northern Italy, Italian warships fought a half-hour battle with German bombers which attacked them off the island of Corsica and sank one battleship.

**MADRID, Sept. 11 (P)**—Spanish naval authorities received information from the Balearic Islands today that it was the Italian battleship Roma which was sunk by German bombers in the Mediterranean. The authorities said 25 wounded sailors from the Roma were hospitalized in Mallorca.

**NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (P)**—The 35,000-ton Italian battleship Vittorio Veneto has arrived at Malta and surrendered to the allies, the BBC reported today, quoting a Reuters dispatch.

This made the fifth Italian capital ship reported to have reached Malta. The BBC broadcast was recorded by NBC.

for the religious and cultural centers.

One idea being discussed is that the Italians themselves might spearhead a force to clear their capital of the enemy but that would depend on the existence of an Italian government with the will to fight.

So long as the Germans hold Rome they will deny the allies advantage of both a military and a political nature. The city is the hub of the country's rail transportation system. It is also the center of valuable air bases.

At the same time it is the symbol of Italian government, and German establishment of some sort of puppet administration there may draw upon this symbolism for all it's worth.

**KEEP this fact clear in your mind:**

Before the war in Europe can be won, we've got to FIGHT AND WHIP the Germans.

We might as well do it in Italy as anywhere else.

#### MAYBE BETTER.

The Italian peninsula is a long, thin finger thrust into the Mediterranean sea. Nowhere is it more than 150 miles wide. We have and can apparently retain control of the air and the sea in the Mediterranean—giving us a wide choice of attack.

#### WAR on a big scale is largely

a matter of communication and supply.

Our supply route through Gibraltar, menaced by German submarines, probably stands up pretty well with the German supply route over the Alps, which is menaced by our bombers.

#### ITALY for the moment is THE

hot spot.

But it isn't the ONLY hot spot.

#### WATCH Britain, from which

clouds of our planes are hammering Germany and German-held Atlantic Europe and where a huge army has been practicing invasion maneuvers for months.

#### WATCH Russia, where the

Germans are being forced back behind their new defense line of the Dnieper river, and where if anything slips in the retirement ANYTHING MIGHT HAPPEN.

Watch the unstable Balkans, which got on the wrong bandwagon and would now like to get on the right one.

#### AND don't take your eye off

Turkey long.

Turkey's chief jewel is the Dardanelles, which has always been coveted by Russia. If the Turks sit tight and HELP NOBODY, they'll have no friends at the peace table—where the Dardanelles will be stacked along with the other chips.

If they should come in at the psychological moment and thrust their vaunted two million bayonets into Hitler's FLANK, they might have a talking point with the Russians when the time comes to apportion the chips.
