Mrs. Brixner Discusses Year's Program; Club Opens Fall Season at Dinner

The federation has broad aims which must be considered separately, Mrs. Brixner said, listing a few as better working conditions for women, education toward making better business women, and community service.

The state president discussed the program for the year, "Winning the War and Winning the Peace", as outlined by the national federation, a board meeting of which she attended in July at Lake George, New York.

Miss Alice Stout, member of the Klamath county health unit, presided during the dinner hour and program, introducing the president of the Klamath Falls club, Mrs. Winifred Gillen, who reported on the district meeting held at Marshfield, and called for a vote of the members on several matters of business.

Mrs. Coral Sabo, BPW chairman for the July bond sale, told how the quota was more than raised with the club working as a unit with the Soroptimists, and Mrs. Olive Cornett who represented the Soroptimist club as co-chairman of the sale, followed up Mrs. Sabo with words of appreciation to members of both organizations for their

efforts that put the campaign over the top by a hundred and nine per cent.

Mrs. Grace Kintgen, treasurer, presented a financial report and urged all members and prospective members to contact her for payment of dues by September the fifteenth, which is the deadline.

Group singing was enjoyed under the direction of Miss Augusta Parker, music chairman for the year.

Table decorations were a reminder of autumn, with arrangements of velvety brown cat-tails mingling with late garden flowers in orange colors and lighted tapers of orange.
