BOY SCOUTS DISTRIBUTE LOAN POSTERS

The Boy Scouts of Klamath Falls have begun an intensive program of war work scheduled for the fall season. The first job was distribution of the Third War Loan poster, "Back the Attack," last Saturday. Next week they will distribute General Arnold's air force posters and the following week they will post notices relative to Christmas mailing to servicemen for the United States postoffice.

As official dispatch bearers for the office of war information, scouts have organized to handle each release as it comes out for the duration of the war. It is a nationwide program.

During the fall months scouts will also intensify their work on many scout subjects such as signaling, mapping, compass, first aid, tracking and stalking, camping and personal fitness. These skills have been part of the scout program since its inception and have proven of great value to those men who entered the armed forces after having received scouting training.

Patterson Returns From South Pacific Fighting Fronts

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11 (AP)—Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson, in a month-long swing around the Pacific war zone, found allied commanders there sufficiently supplied at the moment with materials and manpower to sustain whatever campaigns may be undertaken.

"I saw no shortages of equipment," he said yesterday on his return from the western theater of war. "Everybody wants planes, but that is true of all fronts."

OREGON FARMERS GET TRACTOR QUOTA

Farmers who will need a new crawler type tractor in the last three months of 1943, are asked to file an application with their county USDA War board before October 15, as a limited number of new crawler tractors will be available in Oregon in the last quarter of the year.

Oregon has been given a quota of crawler tractors for agricultural purposes for that period which will be released to farmers by the war production board on recommendation of state and county USDA war boards. So that all applications may receive equal consideration, and the new tractors placed on farms where they will make a maximum contribution to food production, the state war board has set October 15 as the final date for submitting applications.

R. B. Taylor, state war board chairman, points out that new crawler tractors cannot be approved for farming operations where a wheel tractor will perform the work satisfactorily. Replacement of old crawler tractors can be approved only when the present tractor cannot be repaired or does not provide enough power for substantially expanded production, the chairman advises.

Most dealers have the necessary application forms, and generally will assist farmers in filling them out, Taylor reports.

CONTROL PUT ON ONION SHIPPING

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 (AP)—A system of permit controls was imposed today on all shipments of dry onions in excess of 100 pounds originating in the 12 principal onion producing states, effective September 13.

The action was taken by the office of defense transportation and the Interstate Commerce commission, after War Food Administrator Marvin Jones notified these agencies that the supply of dry onions was dwindling and that controls were needed to insure a fair distribution to civilians and to the armed forces.

The order prohibits railroads and motor trucks from accepting for shipment any dry onions in quantities of more than 100 pounds without a permit from the regional war food administration director or a person designated by him. The states are California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Sept. 11 (AP)—Oats were strong today, climbing to new seasonal highs at one time as the trade put a generally bullish interpretation on the government's September 1 crop forecast. The best gains were not held, however, and wheat and rye fell below the previous finish in late trading.

Wheat had opened fairly firm on Winnipeg strength, but sold off under liquidation by some traders and a house with elevator connections. Rye fell off with wheat, although it had received some encouragement earlier from indications that exports of rye flour to allied fronts under lend-lease were on the up grade.

SOME PEACE STOCKS HAVE LIGHT RISE

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—Some peace stocks had a further modest rise today as a number of top ranking industrial leaders moved into fractionally lower ground.

The whole market had a hesitant note.

Such stocks as Montgomery Ward, Johns-Manville, Woolworth, Deere and Oliver farm, all classified as peace issues, moved up fractionally. Other shares a little ahead near the close included International Nickel, United Aircraft and General Electric. U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors and Chrysler were backward.

Rails were mixed. Transactions amounted to about 300,000 shares. Bonds were mixed and commodities irregular.
