Postponement of Social Security Levies Proposed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), asked congress today to decide whether to postpone for a third straight year increased payroll levies upon employers and employees under the social security act.

Congress voted last year and the year before to postpone an increase in the levy to two per cent. Each postponement was at Vandenberg's insistence. Unless a third postponement is voted, the increased levies automatically go into effect January 1.

Jeffers Returns To Home Town

OMAHA, Sept. 14 (AP)—William Jeffers, president of the Union Pacific railroad, and who resigned last week as rubber administrator, returned to his home town of Omaha today—a year ago to the day he left at President Roosevelt's request to direct the nation's rubber program.

to an appropriation bill for the purpose of penalizing three federal employees was "an unwarranted encroachment upon the authority of both the executive and the judicial branches under our constitution" and in his judgment was not binding upon them.

The rider was aimed at Dr. Robert Morris Lovett, government secretary of the Virgin Islands and William E. Dodd, Jr., and Goodwin B. Watson of the federal communications commission, whose political philosophies were questioned by the Dies committee investigating un-American activities.

The War Today

Herr Hitler, Signor Mussolini, General Tojo—meet Mr. Cordell Hull.

Our secretary of state has ideas which are intimately associated with your common welfare. He states that one of this country's war aims is to achieve an iron-clad peace for the world, backed by nations ready to use force to maintain it. He says "If there is anything on which all right-thinking people are agreed, it is that the monstrous specter of a world war shall not again show its head."

Threaten Circulation
Now you three war-lords, as instigators of the present global bloodbath, should be deeply interested in Mr. Hull's declaration. He didn't say so specifically, but his thesis certainly seeks to contemplate putting all of you out of circulation, because there can be no possible assurance of peace so long as you remain at large (or do you remain at large Signor Mussolini?).

Of course, Messrs. Hitler and Mussolini, you wouldn't remember it, but back at the time of the fateful Munich conference I stood close enough to the pair of you so that I could have tickled both your noses with a feather. Since that day I've often pondered on how much anguish could have been saved the world had you both met violent ends then.

Correct Solution
Still, that wouldn't have been the right solution. It would have been trying to right one evil by doing another. As a matter of fact, putting you out of circulation doesn't necessarily mean taking your lives, though I'm sure that you who hold life so cheaply wouldn't mind facing a firing squad or yet the hangman.

However, it strikes me that the LEAST it can mean is depriving you of your liberty so long as you live. Maybe hanging is too good for you and that, as one of my colleagues remarks, you should be locked up and forced to listen continuously to phonographic records of your bombastic speeches. Anyway, your fate is something the allies must decide, and the quicker they do it—and implement it—the better.

Hang the Kaiser
You'll remember, fuhrer, how the allies in the last war shouted themselves hoarse over hanging your predecessor in crime, the kaiser. Then everybody got cold feet. The kaiser lived long and well, until old age led him to his reward.

There's a far different atmosphere this time, though, because we know it's no good beating armies if we don't also eliminate the instigators of the aggression. The axis armies are merely tools which are used by the war-lords, who reproduce their kind, generation after generation.

Get at Roots
To ensure peace we allies must get at the roots of the evil. In the case of Germany, Herr Hitler, we must eliminate from society in one way or another not only your wicked self but all your captains—like Goering, Himmler and Goebbels.

But we shall have to dig deeper than that, because the real and perpetual mainspring of German aggression is Prussian militarism. We must eliminate the Prussian war lords as well—and they won't be hard to name.

Similar in Japan
There's a very similar situation in Japan, General Tojo. There militarism rules. You and the other militarists are guilty of multiple aggression and untold atrocities. We're going to get you, Tojo, and your co-murderers.

As for Italy, signor underbelly, we want you and a few other cowardly gangsters like your son-in-law Count Ciano. That's not asking much.

mercial importance to be taken by MacArthur's forces. It also is the first combined sea and air base to be seized within the Japanese war-empire perimeter extending from The Netherlands East Indies through New Guinea and New Britain, thence down into the northern Solomons.

Lae Next
The impending fall of Lae, where bombers have silenced gun positions, destroyed a bridge and blasted outskirt defenses with 49 tons of bombs, would give the allies virtually complete control of Huon gulf.

Headquarters announced that Liberators bombers struck Sunday night for the first time since August 18 at the enemy's oil and supply center of Makassar, on Dutch Celebes. Making a roundtrip flight of more than 2000 statute miles, the big bombers hit military barracks, petroleum storage and wharf facilities with 27 tons of explosives and incendiaries. One Liberator failed to return.

fascist uprisings and parades had taken place in some parts of northern Italy now occupied by German forces.

Former fascist officials again control Milan, Turin, Genoa, Novara, Cremona and points as far south as Bologna, these dispatches said, and they were reported to be taking fierce reprisals for any anti-fascist activities which had occurred since Mussolini was dismissed by King Vittorio Emanuel.

Mussolini Broadcast
German radio forecasts concurred in the report that Mussolini had been "liberated" by the nazis, but they were in striking variance as to his present whereabouts. He was most commonly reported to be in Cremona with Robert Farinacci, former secretary of the fascist party, and Marshal Erwin Rommel. Nazi propagandists, meanwhile, added fantastic details to their stories of Mussolini's detention and rescue. One German broadcast said that since Mussolini's arrest on July 25 he had been moved about from island to island, "always in the most shameful manner," by the Badoglio government. Then a later broadcast said he had been held under close arrest on various warships, with his guard ordered to kill him should he try to escape.

From the Klamath Republican September 14, 1903

State Treasurer C. S. Moore is quoted at length in the Oregonian in praise of the productivity of Klamath basin brush land, once water is put upon it. Irrigation ditches are being enlarged. The hay crop in the Klamath country is enormous, the price is good and farmers are making money.

One big development is south of Lower Klamath lake. The land is owned by Henry E. Ankney and Roscoe Cantrall.

F. M. Bowne will try pumping from Lost river to irrigate a large tract near Bonanza.

From the Klamath News September 14, 1933

The city of Merrill has been allotted \$17,000 by federal works officials for construction of a waterworks.

Allocation of \$119,000 for construction of the Weed-Klamath highway was confirmed in a letter received by the chamber of commerce today from Leslie Scott, chairman of the state highway commission.

Farm Accident Claims Life of Mexican Laborer

A farm accident on the John Liskay ranch on Lower Klamath lake took the life of Margarito Lara, Mexican, who came here with other Mexican nationals to work in Klamath agricultural harvests this fall.

Lara's back was broken when two sacks of grain fell on him between a combine and a tractor, according to a story of the mishap received here. Lara was taken to a local hospital where he died.

Runoff Election to Be Held for Union

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Today's Roundup

KLAMATH potatoes have done right well by themselves, without a great deal of promotion in winning favorable attention of the public.

Their intrinsic quality, plus proximity to a hungry market, has smoothed the way for orderly disposal of the entire crop in most of the seasons since the basin went into large-scale potato production.

But it seems to us the time has arrived for giving our spuds a splash of ballyhoo. Grading, packaging, etc., are fundamental in any promotion scheme, but at the moment we have in mind something a little more spectacular and ingenious. It couldn't do any damage, and in the long run, it can do a lot of good. There's "glamour in them spuds" that can be nicely brought out with the right salesmanship treatment.

There's talent here to do the job. A promotional committee, named through the chamber of commerce, or potato growers association, and backed with a little cash, could handle it.

We have on the desk a perfect example of what we mean. Ned Harlan, manager of the Boise, Idaho, chamber of commerce, has sent us five postal cards which were put out for servicemen, boosting the Idaho spud. They're clever cartoon cards, playing up the KP angle. Furnished by the Idaho State Department of Agriculture, for the convenience of servicemen, they went over big. Servicemen mailed them all over the United States.

Some 60,000 were first printed. They went so well another 750,000 were ordered.

Schemes of that nature could be used nicely in advertising the Klamath potato, which will be found worthy of anything done for it. The

widely ballyhooed Idaho spud hasn't a thing on our own.

Our Good Neighbors

LOOKING over the war bond records of Oregon counties for August, we find much that looks good for Klamath county and its neighbors.

Klamath went over, 109 per cent of quota. Jackson, on the west, made 106 per cent. Lake county, on the east, went way up to 126 per cent. Deschutes, our northern neighbor, came through nicely at 103 per cent. Douglas, on the west, made 114 per cent.

Those are pleasing figures. We anticipate this family of counties will do equally well on the immense quotas of the Third War Loan. One bordering county—Lane on the north-west—didn't do so well. It made 88 per cent of quota. We'll be looking for Lane to clear the record on the Third War Loan.

Oregon counties that didn't make their August quotas were Baker, Clatsop, Curry, Gilliam, Grant, Jefferson, Josephine, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Morrow, Polk, Sherman, Wallowa and Yamhill.

Camp White soldiers who have gone to Bend on maneuvers are longing for the Rogue river valley, according to Moore Hamilton in the Medford News. "No place to sleep, no place to eat, no transportation, no nothing," is the report on conditions at Bend received by the Medford editor. He says reports indicate Bend is "not accepting the soldiers in the good graces they were accepted here." Knowing something of Central Oregon hospitality, we wonder. Bend must have more than it can handle, if Brother Moore's report is true.

Salem, Longview, and Vancouver, B. C., are among west coast towns that are complaining about continuance of dim-out regulations. Folks over there are yearning for the bright lights like sheepherders after six weeks in the sage brush.

News Behind the News

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14—Wendell Willkie has given some signs of becoming a slightly altered man since his long sit-and-talk sessions on the Ellwood rail fence with the hoosier republicans.

Little wisps of unplayed statements from him lately show him denying the Wallace kind of globaloney represents his "one world" views; also announcing he will campaign for the republican party candidate for lieutenant governor of New York.

The hoosier homefolk politicians and the 27 national committeemen who visited him in Indiana, are being given credit within the party for having inspired these developments. The politicians talked gently to Willkie because they were not sure how strong he is, but made little secret of their current opposition to him.

They know he has a powerful organization and many friends and, they, like everyone else, always want to be with the winner. But they told Willkie he must do two things if he is to get more than a minority of his ex-home state delegation to the republican convention:

First: He must prove by actions that he is actually a republican, drop his individualistic rule and do something to help the party and other people in it.

Second: He must show also that his policies are not a rubber stamp of the new deal in international affairs.

Willkie came back at them trying to justify his position. Victory next year he said rested less upon party ties than upon getting the big independent vote. He also said he had nothing in mind like Wallace, and would make the difference clear.

What he has done since is in line with these hoosier conference developments, but there must be more if he is to start with Indiana.

As the hoosier politicians tell it, Willkie has reason to be a very discouraged man at the moment.

only THREE bridges over the wide Dnieper. There MIGHT be a jam when the retreating Germans start to cross over.

SUPPOSE the Germans get safely to and across the Dnieper, stand fast there and the Russians can't dislodge them?

How will our side GET BEHIND the Dnieper line?

Your map will tell you that TURKEY is the obvious answer.

THE Algiers radio (not always reliable, even if it is ours) says the Germans are proclaiming the rebirth of fascism under Mussolini's personal command and are predicting that he'll cancel the Italian surrender, reorganize the Italian army and end the house of Savoy (King Victor Emanuel).

THE radio at Algiers says there is bitter street fighting in Rome and adds that determined opposition to the Germans is spreading over all of Italy.

Lifting (whether accurately or

not) the curtain of silence that has hung for several days between us and the Balkans, it says there is fierce fighting in Belgrade (Yugoslavia), that 2000 Italian soldiers are fighting Germans in the mountains of Montenegro and that the Balkans are seething with unrest and fighting.

(A LOT of people think the Germans will fight in Italy and elsewhere until licked but will surrender before the fighting gets to Germany. That, of course, is pure opinion.)

IN New Guinea, the Japs ABANDON Salamaua and RUN FOR IT instead of dying on their feet in accordance with their Samurai code. They've been doing that fairly often lately. MacArthur's headquarters describes the Jap forces retreating from Salamaua as "disintegrating troops."

They're trying to get to Lae, 18 miles away to the north, but we have Lae surrounded also.

OUR navy confirms today the Jap announcement yesterday of another bombing raid by our planes against Jap Paramushiro

in the Kuriles. We lost four planes shot down and six more failed to return.

We fired a Jap transport and left it sinking, damaged another and scored hits on three cargo ships, one of which blew up.
