

HELP NEEDED TO MAKE BIG BANDAGE ORDER

More help is needed to complete the order of 45,000 cotton pads at the Red Cross surgical dressing station, Mrs. R. R. Macartney, head of Red Cross work here, reported today.

Deadline on the order was placed at September 15, but only half of the pads are finished now, Mrs. Macartney said. Help is needed in order to finish the order as soon as possible, and with children returning to school and much of the victory garden work over, many workers who dropped out for the summer should be able to return.

Word received from the area offices indicates that the fall work has been set at 40,000 surgical sponges a month for the next three months, in addition to the order of 45,000 cotton pads.

During August, workers made 40,000 surgical sponges. "The August showing was very creditable," Mrs. Macartney said, "in view of the fact that many of our regular workers had to drop out due to increased work in their own homes." The peak was reached in June, when 56,000 sponges were made.

Mrs. Macartney praised the support of auxiliary stations throughout the county, saying that women in outlying communities supported the Red Cross work better than the women of Klamath Falls.

The Altamont headquarters has been temporarily closed because of school adjustments and until it is opened women from that vicinity are asked to work at the Klamath Falls headquarters.

Hours of Red Cross work are from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m., each day and on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Councilmen Okay Big War Bond Purchase With Funds

Empowering the city treasurer to buy \$22,500 worth of Series F war bonds, city councilmen Monday night disposed of funds which otherwise would lie idle for the duration.

Funds were those such as the emergency fire equipment fund, which cannot be used because of priority ratings.

Mayor John Houston requested townspeople to aid in getting rid of unsightly shacks by reporting them to Police Judge Harold Franey. Owners of the buildings would be urged to tear them down. Lumber from some

of the buildings could be sold by the owners, thus helping relieve the lumber shortage, Mayor Houston said.

A letter was read to the council suggesting that the Swan Lake Moulding company be allowed to remove wooden fences and bleachers which they had erected on the ball park on Adams street. The fence and bleachers were contracted for by the former Softball association, but were not paid for, and the company wishes to remove the lumber from the city property. The matter was tabled until the

next meeting of the council. It was voted at the council meeting to continue the present contract with the Humane society for the rest of the calendar year, and draw up a new agreement at that time.

The traffic safety council recommendation that the corner at Second and Klamath be cut back seven feet and that the corner at Pine and Esplanade be cut back three feet were adopted. City Engineer E. A. Thomas was empowered to have this done.

Thomas recommended that the stop button at Main and Esplanade be left there until money and equipment could be

obtained to remedy the situation at that intersection.

Councilmen approved a two-week leave of absence for Police Judge Harold Franey beginning next Sunday. Dr. J. C. Hunt will act as police judge in his absence.

Last Call for Home Canning

We always have wound up the canning season at home by making sauerkraut. Probably the reason is because the late cabbage as a rule seems so much better and is so firm.

Homemade sauerkraut makes me think of all the good-tasting Fall and Winter dinners we are going to have. Our favorite is sauerkraut with weiners or spareribs—and dumplings (made right on top the kraut), sliced onions in vinegar, with baked apple and gingerbread for dessert.

TO MAKE KRAUT IN JARS

Mix shredded cabbage with salt, using 1/2 tablespoon salt to each quart cabbage. Pack firmly into sterilized glass jars, fill with cold water, adjust covers fairly tight. Store in comfortably warm place (75° to 85° F.) and where possible overflow of liquid will do no harm. If scum forms, remove it. The kraut will ferment or cure for a few days, and will be ready to use in a month. At that time, drain off juice, heat to boiling, pour over kraut again, and seal tight. Do not process.

SAUERKRAUT

20 lbs. cabbage
1/2 lb. (1/4 cup) cooking salt

Select firm, mature heads of cabbage. Remove outer leaves; wash well; quarter, remove core; slice very fine. Mix 5 lbs. (about 7 1/2 qts.) shredded cabbage with 2 oz. (3 1/2 tbsps.) salt; place in deep crock or tight wooden keg; tamp down firmly with wooden masher. Repeat until all cabbage is used. Press down, cover with clean white cloth, then with plate or round wooden board small enough to fit down inside crock; weight down with a clean rock to keep cabbage covered with brine that forms. Keep in a warm place, 75° to 85° F. Inspect each day; remove scum with spoon; rinse cloth in clear water.

Kraut will be "cured" (appearance and taste will tell) in 10 to 20 days, depending upon amount of cabbage and temperature.

Kraut may be left in crock or keg all winter, in a cold cellar or basement (take care to remove any scum) or it may be canned from 1 to 3 months after curing. To can: drain off juice, pack cold kraut into hot sterilized jars to 1/2 inch from top; heat juice to boiling, pour over kraut, seal, store in cool dark place. Do not process.

NOTE.—Cooking salt is salt without a filler and comes in bags.
