CLOUDY BATTLE NEWSLIGHTENS STOCK SELLING

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (AP)—Stocks turned moderately lower today under the lightest kind of selling, blamed mainly on the cloudy battle situation in Italy.

Brokers also suggested that big government bond campaign might have diverted some cash that would have gone into corporate securities or caused the liquidation of scattered equities for the purpose of obtaining funds with which to purchase the federal issue. Declines of fractions to a point or so predominated near the close. Transfers were around 400,000 shares.

American Locomotive Preferred (new) breasted the current for a gain of more than 2 points at a 1943 top. Doing fairly well were Bethlehem, Chesapeake & Ohio, Allied Mills, Goodrich, American Can, J. C. Penney and American Smelting. Laggards included Santa Fe, Southern Railway, DuPont, General Motors, Chrysler, Standard Oil (N. J.), Douglas Aircraft, Boeing, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical and U. S. Rubber.

Bonds were narrow.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14 (AP)—Good cash demand led to a firm undertone in grain futures today, but profit-taking and other scattered selling cut down the beet advances. There was some reluctance to trade because of opening of congress today and because war news from Italy was not considered favorable by traders.

Nearby deliveries were strong, and oats featured the market as September and December deliveries again advanced to new 23-year highs at times at 76 1/2 cents and 73 1/2 cents, respectively. In the cash market, No. 2 white oats sold at 81 1/2 cents, also the highest price in 23 years and 16.75; heifers steady; mostly \$13.50-16.00; top \$16.40 on choice to prime weighty heifers; very active market on all cows with good western bred cows \$12.50-13.00; cutters \$8.75 down; bulls firm, with practically top heavy sausage offerings \$13.50; vealers steady at \$15.00-16.00; stock cattle fully steady at \$12.00-14.50.

Salable sheep 4000; total 11,000; market opening fully steady, four loads Idaho spring lambs \$14.65; good and choice native springers \$13.50-14.15; load yearling wethers and four decks Washington ewes unsold.

Highest price paid for lambs was 80 cents per pound. Dennis O'Leary's third place FFA lamb brought \$105.60 from L. D. Ohlson and Richard Williams' sixth place 4-H lamb brought \$74.40 from the Lakeview Logging company. Both were resold for the benefit of the Lakeview service-men's center.

Highest hog price was paid to Bob Nelson for his grand champion 4-H animal, which brought 30 cents a pound or \$71.40.

Nine lambs were resold for USO benefit and two lambs for the benefit of the local Red Cross.
