

AERIAL, NAVAL SUPPORT HELPS SALERNO FIGHT

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at enemy tanks and machine-gun nests.

German Admission

(German broadcasts, which yesterday had reported the allies were evacuating their bridgehead, admitted today that the invaders were "offering resistance near the coast under cover of naval guns," and that "the allies have got their teeth into Salerno and even the most experienced soldiers find it difficult to push them back into the sea.")

Small pieces of ground changed hands repeatedly in the day's fierce conflict. The Germans made their heaviest and most determined attempt to drive the fifth army into the sea by sharp thrusts from the villages of Excavilla and Armoniana, situated on high ground overlooking the entire southern portion of the allied foothold in the Sele river valley.

Bitter

One officer described the fighting there as "exceedingly bitter." The allied troops withdrew there slightly, leaving the enemy holding the two villages, but with every prospect that equally violent combat would begin at the first light of dawn today.

With complete coordination never before attained by any army, navy, and airforce, allied aircraft and warships joined in support of the fifth army, and the airforce threw in the full weight of its striking power which never before was concentrated on so small an area.

Hundreds of Forts

Hundreds upon hundreds of Flying Fortresses, medium bombers, fighter-bombers, dive-bombers and fighters attacked roads, motor transports, troops, and gun positions immediately behind the enemy's front lines and other night bombers carried on the assault after dark.

Hundreds of big shells were poured into Nazi positions, where troops concentrated for counterattacks, by American and British cruisers and destroyers steaming close inshore despite several hit-run bombing attacks and strong counter-fire from German artillery.

Despite all this, Clark's army

still was confronted with a terrific fight in its efforts to expand a small bridgehead and gain fresh footholds on the high ground beyond, from which the Nazis can now command the entire beach area.

Fire Partly Razes Canby Lumber Mill

ALTURAS, Calif., Sept. 15 (AP) Officials of the Ralph Smith Lumber company at Canby said today it would take at least six weeks to resume operation of a big mill badly damaged by fire yesterday. They estimated damage at \$25,000.

However, a smaller mill nearby started working three shifts to keep production going.

The fire started in the plant's boiler room but was brought under control by employees after it had spread to the tool and blacksmith shops.

The Ralph L. Smith Lumber company plant at Canby was operated for five years by the Big Lakes Box company of Klamath Falls, under a lease which expired last fall. The Smith company also operates a remanufacturing plant at Klamath Falls.

LABOR, BUSINESS PUSH BOND DRIVE

The chamber directors' meeting Wednesday adjourned virtually all business but bond-buying. Each member purchased one bond, in addition to previous purchases.

Federal Manpower Program in Effect

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15 (AP) The federal manpower program designed to increase the flow of planes to fighting fronts by speeding Pacific coast production went into effect today.

Charles E. Wilson, executive vice-chairman of the war production board, said in a statement the program's purpose "is to establish and maintain a balance between production demand and manpower supply."

He said that top priorities on the Pacific coast probably would be assigned to aircraft, high octane gasoline and shipbuilding.

SOVIETS TAKE NEZHIN; BLAST DNEIPER LINE

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Star, reported today that a Russian night attack broke the German intermediate line defending Lozovaya in the central Ukraine as the red army pressed a general advance toward the Dnieper.

The autumn rains had started falling in the Ukraine, the dispatch said, bogging down roads and fields and slackening the speed of maneuvers, but the tanks and motorized infantry continued to slog forward in pursuit of the retreating enemy.

No further reports of the position around Bryansk were issued since yesterday's dispatches said the red army marched to within view of the city. (The Germans have reported they evacuated Bryansk.)

Drive Proceeds

The soviet drive west across the Ukraine proceeded steadily despite the admitted difficulties created temporarily by the mud.

Lozovaya, 30 miles northeast of Pavlograd and 65 miles northeast of Dnepropetrovsk, was the last of the old Ukrainian bastions left to the Germans. It served as one of the main defenses south of Kharkov during the first winter offensive and was the scene of one of their counterattacks during the second winter. It was the high water mark of the Russian counter-offensives in the south.

Brooks-Scanlon Buys 30,000 Acres of Yellow Pine Land

BEND, Ore., Sept. 15 (AP)—One of the biggest lumber deals in recent central Oregon history—the purchase of 30,000 acres of yellow pine timber land in the Sisters country—was announced today by the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Company, Inc.

The stands of pine, which stretch through northwestern Deschutes and southwestern Jefferson counties, will be milled in Bend.

Manager A. J. Glasgow said the mill will extend its railroad to the newly acquired pine belt next year to recover damaged timber, although regular cutting will not begin for several years.

2. Gen. Calvi Di Bergolo, puppet commandant of Italian forces in Rome, had formerly liquidated the Badoglio cabinet and named commissioners—all of them well known in the fascist regime—to take over the functions and responsibilities of the ministries.

The Mussolini decrees, said to be signed by the former premier, were read over the German radio station, Zeesen. They were read not by Mussolini but by Alessandro Pavolini, former Italian propaganda minister, who was named in one of the decrees as "temporary secretary" of the new fascist party.

PASCO, Wash., Sept. 15 (AP)—The public relations office at the Pasco Naval Air station said today the two men killed yesterday in the crash of a training plane were Capt. Felix W. McKenna Jr., a marine, from Grosse Point, Mich., and Machinist Mate 2nd Class Grant H. Elner of Pasco.

The plane plunged into a pasture shortly after the takeoff. It had just returned from a routine flight to Walla Walla.
