asked that the high command give a specific answer to charges that adequately trained men are being kept unnecessarily long in army camps in this country. McNarney said he could not answer questions of this nature in open session. He was then instructed by Chairman Reynolds (D-NC) to produce concrete figures for committee members and other legislators at a scheduled closed meeting this afternoon.

Reynolds acted after Senator Holman (R-Ore.) asserted there was "no use of us holding meetings if we are not going to learn anything."

The deputy chief of staff told the committee he could not give publicly figures on the number of adequately trained men that still are in this country, because the information would be of great value to the enemy. He added that he would make the information available in executive session.

Under questioning by Senator Austin (R-Vt.), McNarney said there now are about 1,500,000 married men in the army, of whom about 700,000 are fathers.

Internal Revenue Appeals Community Property Statute

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 (AP)—The internal revenue bureau has appealed a tax court decision upholding the Oklahoma community property law and also has refused to recognize a similar Oregon statute.

Community property laws permit husband and wife to divide income of either for tax purposes.

Treasury officials yesterday included both Oklahoma and Oregon in a list of 10 states with such laws, explaining that in those states married couples filing separate returns on income earned by only one spouse might claim a \$624 victory tax exemption on each return.

KLAMATH MAY BE KEY SPOT ON AIR MAP

Klamath Falls was maneuvered into a prospective key position on the continental air map today, as Western Air Lines petitioned the civil aeronautics board for a route from San Francisco to Anchorage, Alaska, via this city, Seattle, Ketchikan and Juneau.

Announcement of the application was made by Thomas Wolfe, traffic vice president of Western Air Lines, who is en route today to the Northwest Aviation Planning Conference in Wenatchee, Wash., scheduled for Friday and Saturday, September 17 and 18.

Wolfe said the proposed air route would fork off at Anchorage, Alaska, for the terminal points of Nome, Alaska, via McGrath and Fairbanks.

"The Alaskan route will involve no foreign operations," he said, "since it will continue directly from the United States along the coast to Alaskan cities without touching any point in Canada."

The new route application, according to Wolfe, follows the CAB's recent favorable decision granting a non-stop route from Los Angeles to San Francisco. It supplements the airline's pending application, filed several months ago, for an extension from San Francisco to Seattle, via Sacramento, Calif., the Inland Oregon Empire, and Portland.
