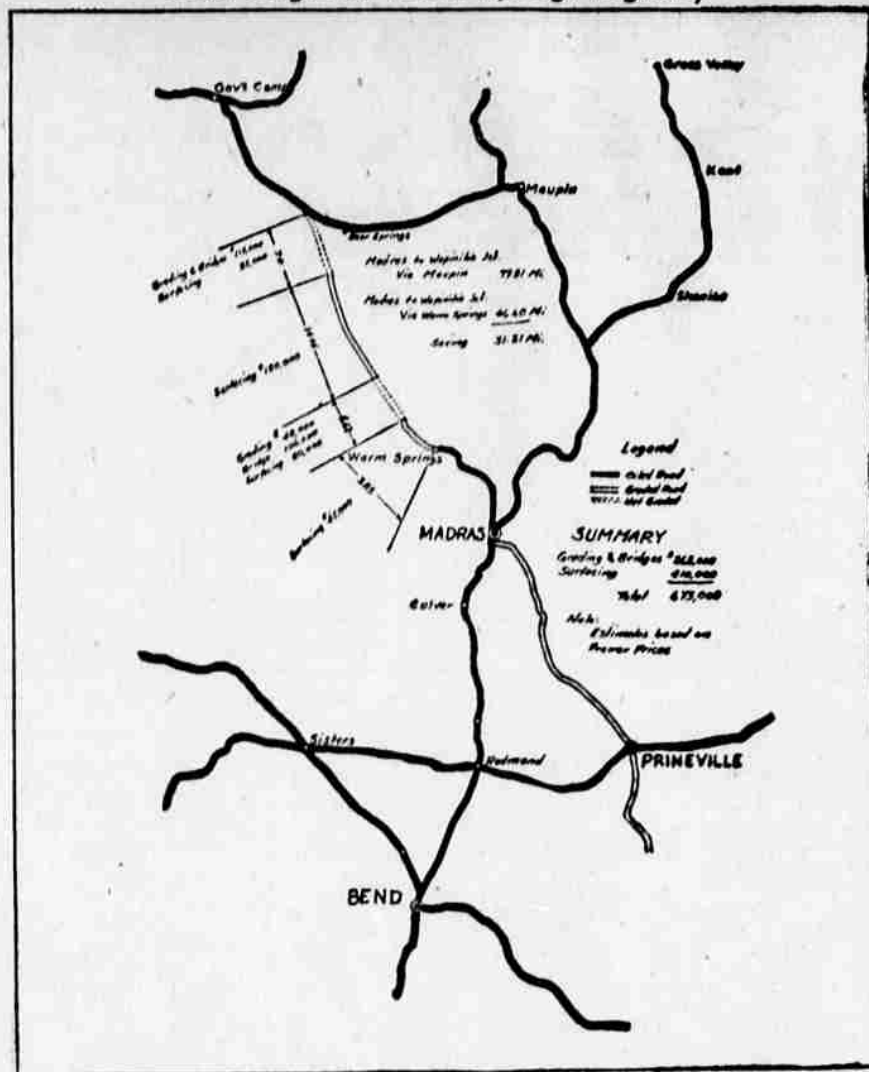

Bend Plugs For Warm Springs Highway

Warm Springs Highway Will Be of Great Value to State

(By Bend Chamber of Commerce)

The part the Warm Springs highway is destined to play, not only in reducing the distance in to Portland from central and southeastern Oregon points, but in cutting travel time from California, is being emphasized by communities east of the Cascades, which urge designation of the highway as the interior region's No. 1 post-war project.

When completed, this highway will shorten the distance from Madras and points south and east, into Portland by 31.31 miles, and due to the fact that it eliminates three bad grades, it is believed that it will speed up passenger traffic at least one hour and commercial traffic by at least two hours.

Use of this route, it is pointed out, will not only cut travel time between California points and Portland, but will relieve pressure on the Pacific highway, and will give Portland a much faster route into southern Idaho and southeastern Oregon via highways 97 and 20.

Proponents of this highway in-

st that its construction will make an annual saving to the commercial and private vehicles, which will use it, of at least half the estimated cost of completion.

The Warm Springs highway was started as a "public lands" road. In 1939 it was made eligible for forest highway funds; in 1940 it was made a part of the federal aid system; and, in 1941 was designated as of strategic military importance.

TEBBE NAMED AS ATTORNEY FOR TULELAKE

TULELAKE—C. J. Tebbe of the law firm of Tebbe and Correl, Yreka, will serve as city attorney for Tulelake, succeeding Charles Lederer, Alturas, whose resignation was accepted several weeks ago by the city council.

The new city attorney will meet with the council once every two months and on other occasions when official business demands. A retainer fee of \$300 annually was agreed upon, \$50 to be allowed for trips other than routine travel to meet with the board.

Chief of Police Frank G. Rhodes, who is far from satisfied with the juvenile delinquency problem here, presented a letter to the council at the time that Tebbe's appointment was announced circulated by FBI headquarters in Washington D. C., asking for strict enforcement of all laws and immediate prosecution of offenders, particularly where enforcement may be an example to juvenile delinquents. The council voted funds for a small booth to be used in various campaigns and financial drives in the future that will be completed at once for use in the Third War Loan drive.

The Malin Elks served notice

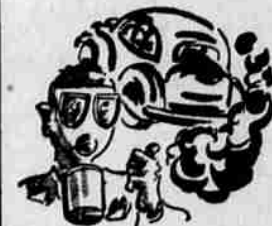
on that prosperous south-end community that they intended to get a bond from every earing individual in the community in the September drive.

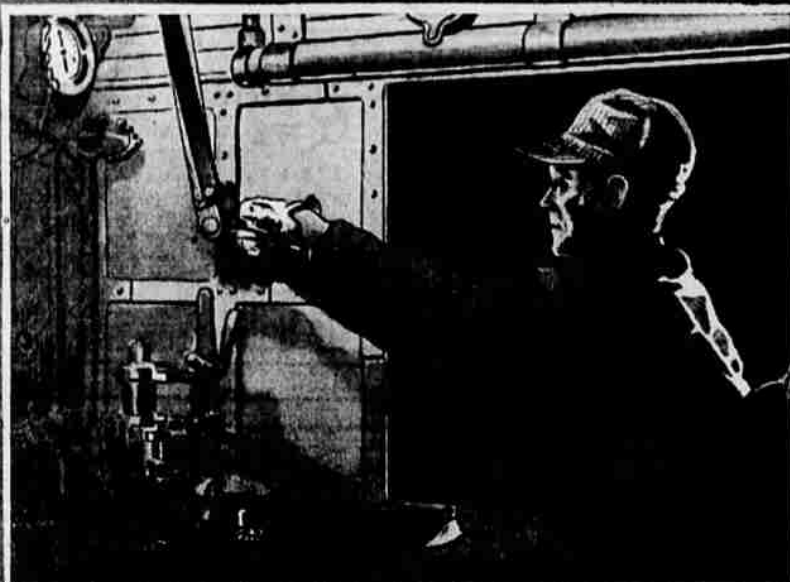

10. Give yourself a chance. Children and adults should have periodic physical examinations by a competent physician and dentist. Any evidence of illness should receive immediate attention.
11. Know and practice good home nursing care.
12. Call upon your local health department for help in protecting the health of those living in your block.
