

JENKINS TELLS ENTRY RULES FOR 4-H SHOW

Rules for entry in the annual 4-H club junior livestock show were announced today by Clifford Jenkins, county club leader.

For eligibility, each exhibitor shall have owned and cared for the animal or animals exhibited and shall have made the required report of work to his leader. Exhibitors must turn in up-to-date record books by September 10 or at the show, and all breeding cattle over six months of age must be accompanied by clean Bangs certificates. These may be obtained by calling J. C. Hunt at the city hall.

General rules include that no exhibitors may make more than three entries in a lot. No animal may be shown in more than one lot except for special contests. The sire determines the breed in which the animal is shown, and poultry not properly fed, groomed, and cleaned are subject to being excluded from competition by the sifting committee.

Officials of the livestock show are Lee Jacobs, C. A. Henderson, Fred Peterson, and Art Cole on the executive committee; Harry Lindgren and L. J. Allen on the judging committee. Bob McCambridge will act as clerk and Clifford Jenkins as corresponding secretary.

Four-H division herds are Gerald West and Velton Haskins, beef; Joe Fotheringham and Alvin Cheyne, hogs; I. W. White, sheep; Walter Wilson and Taylor High, dairy; Harold Schieferstein, poultry and rabbits; George Hagelstein, weighmaster; Rex High, special contests and awards and the livestock parade.

The auction sale committee consists of Ring Master L. A. West, known as "Granddaddy of the Junior Livestock Show," Auctioneer Charles Wiese, and Sale Committee Chairman Hod Eller.

Weekly Market Trend

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the government leased wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. The material, in the form of a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market, is not intended to replace spot day by day market reports.)

Cattle Markets

The cattle market was active at north Portland Monday with only 1400 head of cattle and 250 calves arriving, all for local sale. Prices were strong to 25 cents higher than the weekend before with some canner cows up as much as 50 cents. Grass-fat steers sold at \$11.50 to \$13.50 and some heavy hay-fed ones at \$14, while common ones ranged down to \$9. Grass-fat heifers brought \$10 to \$11.75. At Chicago cattle prices were firm to 15 cents higher on fed kinds with the bulk of fed steers and yearlings sold at \$15.75 to \$16.95 top.

Despite midwest marketings being reported the largest since last November the demand is holding prices up well and competition for replacement kinds has put grass steers in good position. With the shortage of meat in many sections, packers are pointing out that even in normal times one out of every seven animals carries bruised meat that must be cut out, and that with shortage of labor and rush of handling, farmers must use special care to cut down losses resulting from injury to animals. They particularly suggest that farmers dehorn animals, see that nails, bolts and wire do not protrude into corrals, shipping cars or trucks, and that they avoid over and underloading and the use of clubs or whips in handling livestock.

Sheep and Lamb Markets
Lambs, too, were in good demand at north Portland Monday with prices 25 to 50 cents above the close of the week before. Receipts totaled 3000 though only 1400 were offered locally. This followed arrival

of 4500 head the week before. Good to choice spring lambs brought \$12 to \$12.50 with a few sorted lots at \$13. Medium to good light feeders went at \$9.50 to \$10 and common yearlings at \$8. The San Francisco market was about steady and Chicago's strong to 15 cents higher than the Friday before, with fed spring lambs from north central states bringing \$14.25, and no western lambs offered. However, Omaha prices were weaker. While good and choice western spring lambs continued at \$13.50 to \$14, feeding lambs were weak to 25 cents lower, with bulk of sales at \$12 to \$12.75.

Hog Markets

With all of 1400 head of hogs arriving at north Portland offered for local sale, prices were around 25 cents up from the weekend before, good and choice top hogs selling mostly at \$16. Good sows brought \$12 to \$12.50 and good to choice feeder pigs \$14.50 to \$16. San Francisco, with few hogs offered, reported a top price of \$15.85. Chicago's trading was fairly active with bulk of the top hogs up to \$15.10 to \$15.35.

Eastern hog markets have shown an unsteady trend recently whenever prices have approached the ceiling level. Heavy butchers and sows have been generally holding up better than medium weights. Favorable war news has had a softening effect on demand for wool. However, the trade is showing some interest in auctions of territory wool held in the west, September 13-25, by the Commodity Credit corporation at appraisal prices. A little unrestricted domestic fine wool was sold last week at \$1.10 to \$1.12, clean basis, for French combing lots, and moderate sales of Australian fine lots were made at prices a little under previous sales.

Crawler Tractor Requests Should Be In By October 15

Farmers who will need a new crawler type tractor in the last three months of 1943, are asked to file an application with their county USDA war board before October 15, as a limited number of new crawler tractors will be available in Oregon in the last quarter of the year.

Oregon has been given a quota of crawler tractors for agricultural purposes for that period which will be released to farmers by the war production board on recommendation of state and county USDA war boards. So that all applications may receive equal consideration, and the new tractors placed on farms where they will make a maximum contribution to food production, the state war board has set October 15 as the final date for submitting applications.

R. B. Taylor, state war board chairman, points out that new crawler tractors cannot be approved for farming operations where a wheel tractor will perform the work satisfactorily. Replacement of old crawler tractors can be approved only when the present tractor cannot be repaired or does not provide enough power for substantially expanded production, the chairman advises.

Most dealers have the necessary application forms, and generally will assist farmers in filling them out, Taylor reports.
