BUYING LAND AMBITION OF SPUD WORKERS

TULELAKE—Mexican nationals who are in the United States for the first time this year to alleviate the labor shortage are looking forward to buying land and equipment that in the past they have never been able to afford, according to Mr. Chavez, manager and interpreter who make this week before the Tulelake Rotary club.

They are studying also American ways of farming and many of them will pass on information gleaned here to fellow farmers when they return to their homeland.

Average wage of agricultural workers in Mexico is 75 cents per day in American money and before the end of the potato harvest many of those employed here will be making \$10 per day.

Fifty-seven thousand men most of them from farming districts in Mexico, are employed in California with an additional 40,000 at work in the Pacific northwest, including Idaho. Tulelake has at present 517 and 500 more will arrive September 25.

All of those sent into the states have been carefully selected, and few exceptions are sending most of the money earned back to families in Mexico.

Clark W. Fensler, program chairman, introduced Mr. Chavez.

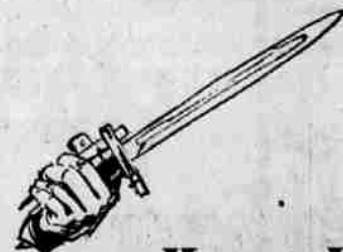
