

MALIN FACULTY SIGNS UP FOR SPUD HARVEST

MALIN—Faculty members of the Malin high school have signed 100 per cent to help in the potato harvest, most of the instructors signifying willingness to captain platoons of children to be recruited largely from the non-agricultural areas of the county.

With a large number of the farm boys and girls already scheduled to work either at home in the fields or for neighbors, it is expected that the organized units will come largely from Klamath Falls and the surrounding rural communities outside the potato growing districts.

Tentative age limit for the young workers has been set at 13, but it is expected that where health permits that the decision on age may be elastic and the younger people may get work in the fields.

It is expected that from 15 to 25 children will be organized in each platoon. Transportation problems, the date for the proposed closing of the schools and other angles of the proposed use of "youth battalions" to help harvest this season's huge crop will be worked out in the near future by the office of the county superintendent of schools, a committee appointed for the purpose, and the county agricultural office.

SAFETY CAMPAIGN STARTED TO SCHOOL

MALIN—Because of the recent fatal injuries of two young children in the Malin community in accidents involving trucks, Joe LaClair, principal of the Malin grade school, has organized a safety campaign in an effort to educate children of both grade school and preschool age in taking precautions while in the vicinity of traffic.

Police have been elected from among students of the sixth grade, who will in the future caution small children playing in the streets and rural areas, will keep watch of others on bicycles and those crossing lanes of traffic near the school buildings.

A license will be issued soon for bicycle riders by LaClair and a card bearing rules for safety first practice.

Card holders violating these rules or a traffic law will be penalized by recall of the bike license.

Student response to the plan was immediate and LaClair asks also that all parents join in the campaign to help prevent future accidents.

Thelma Rose is here from Vancouver, Wash., to help with the church work at the Friend church here. She will be employed at the Glenger grocery.

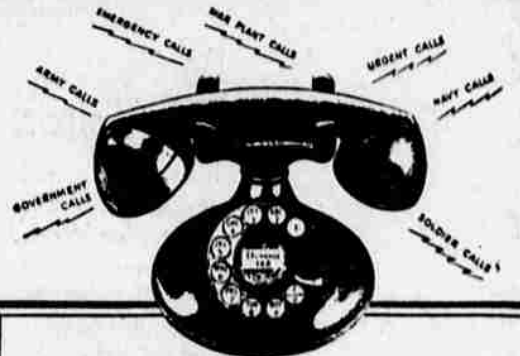
Guy C. Clark was taken to
