French Underground Sabotage Hampers Nazi Reinforcing

BERN, Switzerland, Sept. 18 (AP)—French underground forces, increasing their attacks against railroads in southern France over which the nazis are pouring supplies and reinforcements into Italy, are causing grave delays in German troop movements, it was reported today. The rail line from Bellegarde to Bouvet, only recently re-established with the construction of the Longerey viaduct, has been dynamited again, a dispatch to the newspaper La Suisse at Geneva said. The dispatch said that Italian troops had also taken a hand in recent sabotage, tearing up almost 300 feet of track on the Mont Cenis line in Italy and obstructing the Mont Cenis tunnel.

KLAMATH WINS IN SAFETY CONTEST

Klamath Falls won an honorable mention in the 1942 national pedestrian protection contest. Mayor John Houston learned this week.

The contest report submitted to Mayor Houston stated that "Klamath Falls, a consistent winner of traffic safety contests, again won high honors in the AAA pedestrian protection contest for 1942. With only one pedestrian killed during the last year and with one of three best activity programs of any city reporting in the 10,000-25,000 population group, Klamath Falls well deserves its honorable mention award."

The pedestrian accident record shows that Klamath Falls ranked among the top five cities in reduction of pedestrian injuries during 1942 as compared with the average of the previous two years.

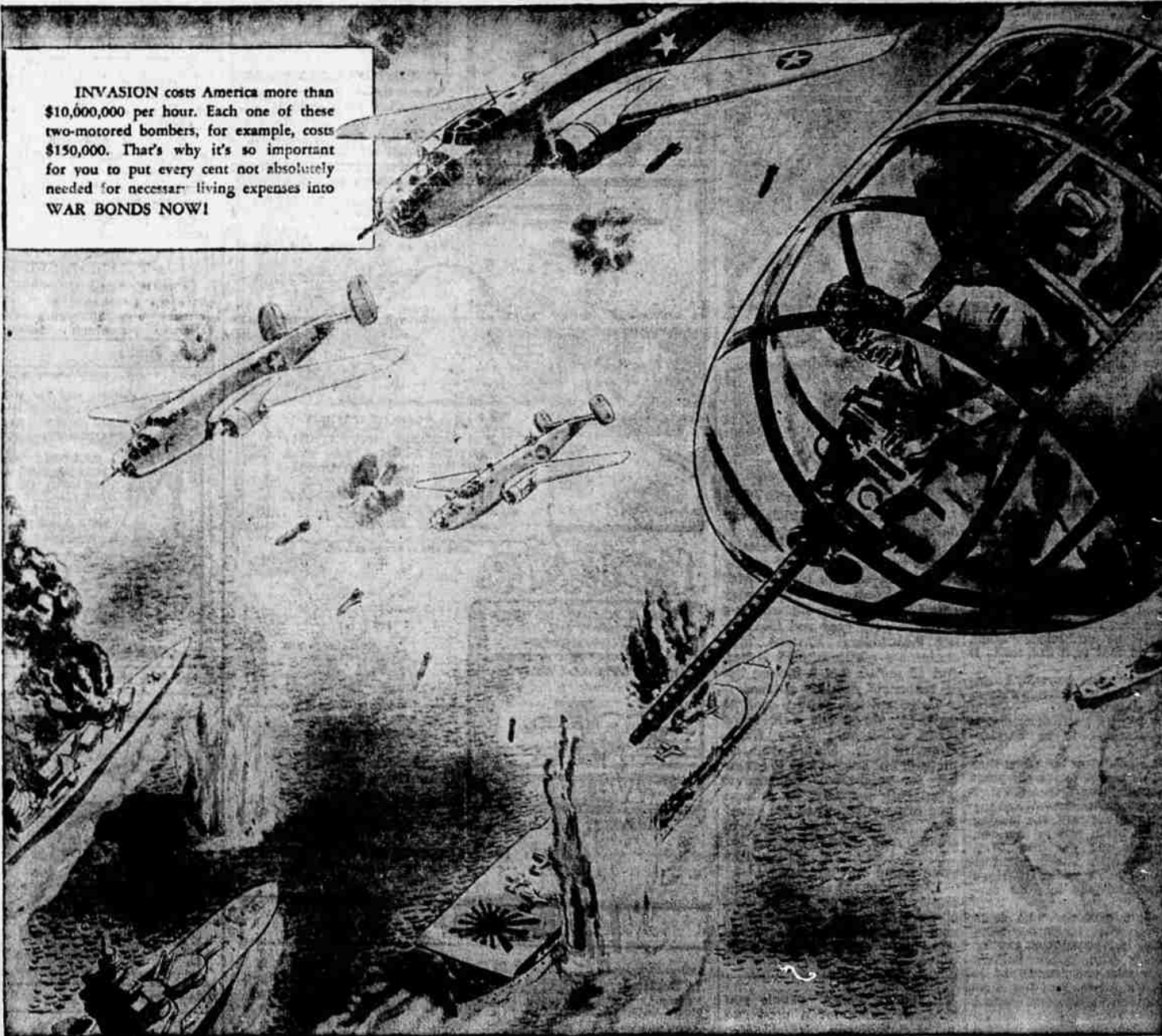
