STOCKS SWING UP FOR FIFTH DAY IN ROW

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—The stock market on balance made its fifth successive advance today despite the interference of considerable profit cashing in the latter part of the session.

Industrials, notably blue chips, pushed higher at the start in active dealings. The pace slowed after mid-day, however, although transfers exceeded 1,000,000 shares for the first time in nearly two weeks. At the close extreme gains running to 2 or more points were trimmed in many cases and there was a smattering of losers.

Bullard Co. jumped more than a point when the company reported half net of \$4.21 a share against 76 cents in the like period last year.

On the upside the greater part of the time—some slipped eventually—were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Santa Fe, General Motors, Chrysler, Goodrich, U. S. Rubber, Sears Roebuck, United Aircraft, Western Union, Westinghouse, DuPont, East-

man Kodak, American Can, Allied Chemical, J. I. Case, International Harvester and Johns-Manville.

Bonds were selectively improved.

Germany Is Taking Chances

Quite an innocently happy item has recently come out of Germany. The Nazi government this year sent the Reich's principle colonies of bees away on a vacation.
