COUNTY GETS MONEY FROM TIMBER CUT

Timber cutting on a sustained yield basis on the 2,500,000 acres of O&C railroad grant, lands in 18 western Oregon counties during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, not only supplied 415 million board feet of lumber for war and industrial purposes, but also resulted in payments of nearly \$1,000,000 in cash to the general fund of the counties in which the land is situated.

E. K. Peterson, acting district forester in charge of the Southern Oregon area, states that Klamath county received an aggregate of \$174,219.97 from O&C funds. Since O&C land occurs in only a part of the southwest portion of the county, Klamath county does not participate as heavily as some of the other land grant counties. Douglas county, with \$253,709.88, received the largest payment; Jackson county, with \$169,000, was second; Lane county, third; and Josephine county, fourth.

The gross receipts of the O&C administration are pooled, and then 50 per cent is divided among the counties according to the proportion of the total valuation of O&C lands that existed in each county in 1916—the year the lands reverted to the department of the interior from the Oregon and California (now Southern Pacific) railroad. For the past five years the O&C has been making an additional payment of 25 per cent for back taxes accrued prior to 1937. The 1943 payments have liquidated this obligation. Henceforth, 25 per cent will accrue to the federal treasury. The remaining 25 per cent is available for administration of the O&C lands, including protection from fire which is contracted to the state of Oregon forestry department.

RAM SALE LOW IN RECEIPTS, UP IN QUALITY

LAKEVIEW—The Southern Oregon ram sale which came to a close at the fairgrounds here Wednesday was below that of 1942 in gross receipts and number of animals sold, but it surpassed last year's sale for quality rams, according to County Agent Victor Johnson, secretary.

The sale grossed \$8235, about \$600 less than in 1942, with 245 rams going through the auction ring at an average price of \$33.61 per head. Average price paid last year was \$43.82, the decrease due chiefly to restrictions and regulations with which sheepmen have to contend.

H. E. Noah of Ontario, Ore., purchased the top ram at the sale for \$130 from Dave Waddell of Amity, Ore. The animal was a yearling Suffolk stud ram. Last

year's top animal brought \$95. Largest purchaser was W. H. Neidiffer of Devon, Calif., who bought 46 rams for which he paid \$1783. Next largest purchaser was W. H. Leehmann of Lakeview, who paid \$1000 for 30 yearling rams, all Ramboulllets.

Largest consignment came from the Cunningham Sheep company, Pendleton, Ore., which brought the owners \$2655 for 100 yearling Lincoln Ramboulllet crossbred rams. Of the 256 rams offered for sale, only 11 from the R. C. Burkhardt ranch at Lebanon, Ore., failed to sell.

W. H. Leehmann, Lakeview, was general chairman of the sale, with Earl O. Walter of Filer, Idaho, as auctioneer.
