

SERVICES FOR GROSSEN WILL BE HELD HERE

Memorial services for the late Howard Grossen, member of the United States navy construction battalion, who died of gunshot wounds somewhere in Africa on August 17, will be held at 11 o'clock Sunday morning at St. Paul's Episcopal church. It was announced by Grossen's widow, Hallie Wigant Grossen. All friends of the young man are invited to attend.

Mrs. Grossen received word this past week from Chaplain Earl F. Naus, advising her that funeral services for her husband were conducted about 15 miles from Mateur on the Beija road, and a memorial service held later at camp. A picture of the services and the flag draped casket, was sent to Mrs. Grossen by the chaplain.

In addition to his wife, Grossen is survived by one daughter, Patricia Louise, 10, San Francisco; his mother, Mrs. Abraham Grossen, four brothers, Abraham, Alfred and George, all of North Bend, Ore.; Clarence J., US navy; four sisters, Mrs. Terrence Christiansen, Mrs. Robert Shay, Caroline Grossen, all of North Bend, and Mrs. Laura Anderson of Klamath Falls. Grossen enlisted in the Seabees from this city. He had been employed by the Quality Market since 1932, and in 1941, with C. R. Eichmann, purchased the business. Grossen remained a partner during the time he was in the service. Last word was received from him in a letter dated one day before his death. He was born in Prindle, Wash., September 27, 1910, and was 32 years of age at the time of his death. Mrs. Grossen is employed here at Craig's. They were married November 9, 1937, in this city.

Walkout in Dodge Plant Halts Army Truck Shipment

DETROIT, Sept. 21 (AP)—A Chrysler corporation spokesman reported today a walkout by 527 employees of the Dodge truck export shipping department, following a wage dispute, halted all shipments of Dodge army trucks. Officials of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) agreed with the company statement that the workers left their jobs after failing to obtain a wage increase.
