

# LEGION HEARS KING TELL OF NAVAL POWER

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 23 (AP)—Shattering blows against the enemy "with all weapons that can be brought to bear, synchronized and coordinated with overwhelming assault," constitute the aim of the navy, Admiral Ernest J. King, commander in chief of the U. S. fleet, asserted today.

He told the national convention of the American Legion that attacks recently carried out with great damage upon Japanese positions on the Marcus and Gilbert islands in the South Pacific are only "the shape of things to come."

King emphasized throughout his address the importance of the navy's swiftly growing air arm now striking hard at enemy bases, particularly in the Pacific.

"The navy's strategy and tactics," he said, "have always revolved around those weapon-bearers which can hit the farthest and the hardest. In this present war these bearers are aircraft. This is thoroughly understood by all naval officers. Air-mindedness in the navy is by no means the exclusive property of the navy aviator."

But he laid great stress on the importance of close coordination of all branches in any engagement, asserting:

"Unity and team work is the basis of the navy's fighting doctrine. It is the navy's aim to strike the enemy at any given point with all the weapons that can be brought to bear, synchronized and coordinated in overwhelming assault."

Stating that "the ultimate test of a military organization is its performance in combat, its discharge of the vital and sacred duty to defend its country against the enemy," he said naval aviation particularly "has met and is meeting this test. The record of Midway, the Solomons, the U-boat war in the Atlantic, bear witness. . . ."

## New American Ace Downs Five Zeros in One Action

U. S. HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC, Sept. 23 (AP)—A new American flying ace has emerged from heavy raids on Japanese bases in the Solomons with a record of shooting down five Zeros in a single engagement.

Marine Major Gregory Boyington, 30, of Okanogan, Wash., accomplished the rare feat last Tuesday as almost 150 Dauntless dive bombers and Avenger torpedo bombers, escorted by fighters, raided the Ballale air-drome on Bougainville island.

Other pilots in dogfights brought down ten other Zeros. Against the total of 15 Japanese planes destroyed, we lost four fighters but two pilots were known to have been saved.

Boyington, who bagged six bombers while flying with the American volunteer group in China, now has 11 victories to his credit and becomes one of the leading aces in the South Pacific.

His one day's record equals that of the late Marine Lt. Col. Harold W. Bauer, who also shot down five Zeros in the early days of the fight for Guadalcanal. Marine Captain James Swett of San Mateo, Calif., brought down seven Japanese planes in a single engagement last April 7, but all were dive bombers.

The American raiders heavily bombed gun positions, revetments, supply dumps and bivouacs at Ballale, a navy spokesman said. Dogfights filled the

sky for half an hour as 50 to 60 Japanese fighters attempted to intercept.

Although this is his second combat tour in the Solomons, the attack was the first time that Major Boyington had contacted the enemy in his area. He joined the marines in May, 1935. Resigning as a Pensacola instructor in 1941, he went to China, then rejoined the marines last November.

Boyington was graduated from the University of Washington where he starred in swimming and wrestling.

The enemy is steadily pouring mechanized equipment into the South Pacific. We cannot afford to slacken even for a split second.—Tokyo radio.

## ELINOR GLYN DIES IN LONDON HOME

LONDON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Elinor Glyn, well known novelist, died early today at the age of 78 after an illness of several weeks.

Mrs. Glyn, who would have been 79 on October 17, entered a nursing home three weeks ago.

The writer established her literary reputation with the novel "Three Weeks," but she was perhaps equally well known as the woman who taught Rudolph Valentino, famous star of the silent movies, how to make screen love.

"Three Weeks," which has been described as the foundation of the modern sex novel, was so daring it shocked grandmothers and caused a storm of protest, but it turned out to be one of the greatest popular successes of the day. She was once offered \$40,000 for the manuscript of the book.
