

U. S. FIGHTERS HALT RAID ON GUADALCANAL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Shooting down two enemy bombers, American fighter planes drove off a Japanese bombing raid on Guadalcanal, the navy reported today.

The enemy raiding group, largest reported over the island in the central Solomons in many weeks, was composed of "12 or 16 enemy bombers."

Only light material damage and a few casualties resulted before the Japanese were driven off the morning of September 21, Solomons time.

The navy reported also another raid by six Japanese planes which dropped bombs near the air strip on Guadalcanal. Only slight damage was caused and no casualties were suffered in that raid on September 10, Solomons time.

The two raids raised to five the number of attacks by Japanese planes in the Guadalcanal area since September 13.

Japs Prepare Evacuation of Tokyo As Defense Measure

LONDON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The Japanese government has decided to prepare "for the moving of government departments, industrial establishments and the civilian population from Tokyo as well as other important cities in the interest of improving their defense," the Tokyo radio said yesterday.

The broadcast listed a number of drastic measures, including total mobilization of the civilian population and the abolishment of age limits to make all persons liable for national service, which it said were announced today by Premier Hideki Tojo and the government information office "in view of the decisive phase upon which the war will enter during the coming months."

Other Measures
In addition to the evacuation of the Japanese capital and other important cities to strengthen "the defense of the country," the government announced these measures:

Increase of anti-aircraft defense forces, especially the "air protection in industrial regions."

Special measures for the protection of government buildings and factories in Tokyo and other big cities of the country.

Strengthening of government control over all industry.

Centralization of traffic on land and water.

Applications for the cookers may be obtained at dealers, the war price and rationing board, and from the farm machinery rationing board, room 207, federal building.

Families who hold certificates that have expired, and who wish to purchase cookers, may get a time extension on their certificates from the farm machinery rationing board. Any persons holding certificates who do not intend to use them should have them cancelled by the board.
