UMW Signs New Coal Contract, Raising Pay to Miners

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—The United Mine Workers and the Illinois Coal Operators association announced today they had signed a new agreement which would increase the earnings of underground workers an average of \$1.75 a day for a five-day week.

This would be accomplished by lengthening the work day and paying for travel time. The agreement, subject to approval of the war labor board and an increase in the ceiling price of coal, provides an entirely new basis for calculating the work day in bituminous mines.

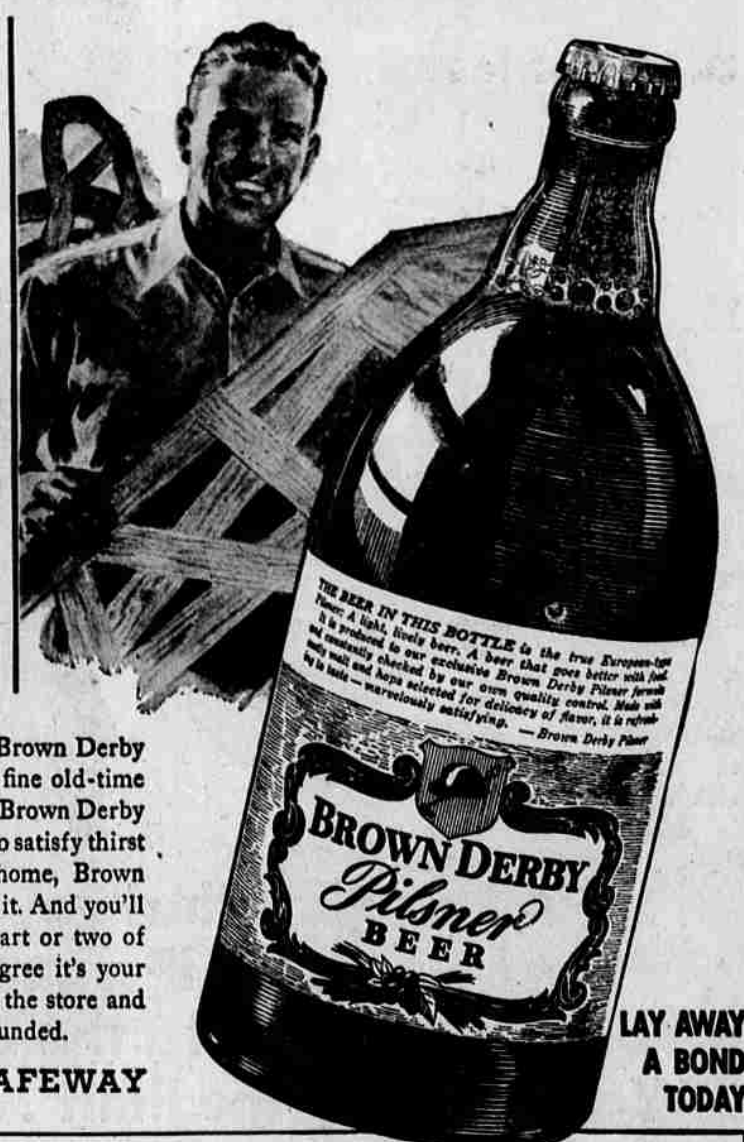
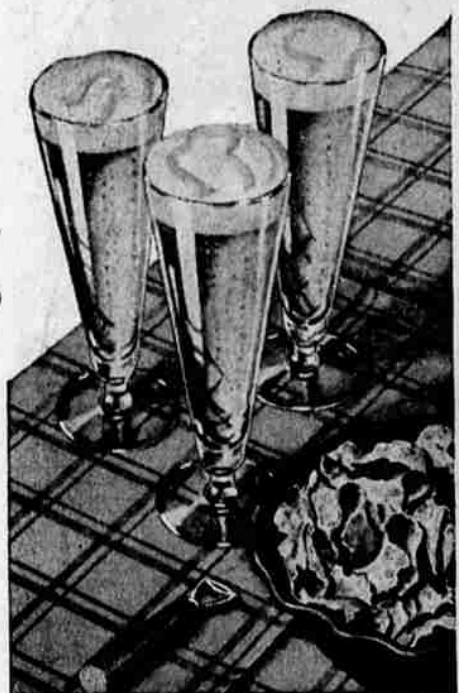
