

DR. SOULE TO PRACTICE IN MEDFORD

Dr. A. A. Soule, since 1915 a practicing physician in Klamath Falls, announced Wednesday that he would leave for Medford and enter practice in the valley city by October 4.

Dr. Soule came to Klamath Agency in 1912 as physician for the government, US Indian service. For two years he was employed by the war department, holding a contract to care for the men who were building the early day roads into Crater Lake national park and in the Sand Creek and Sun mountain areas. Dr. Soule served as county coroner from 1916 to 1918, and was commissioned a first lieutenant in the U. S. army medical corps during World War One, but was not called to active duty.

Mrs. Soule will remain here at the family home, 1945 Main street. Dr. Soule said that he had volunteered for service in the war area. He plans to return to Klamath Falls six months after the close of the war.

Lots of Liquor, But None to Drink

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Liquor is flowing into this country at an unprecedented rate, a treasury report disclosed today and importers said the current whisky shortage is proving a b-

nanza to Latin-American countries.

During August such imports, reflected by sales of internal revenue stamps, reached a record high of 3,785,000 gallons, contrasted to 967,000 gallons in the corresponding month a year ago and a pre-war monthly average of less than 1,000,000 gallons.

ARMISTICE HOLDS OREGON MANEUVERS

FOURTH CORPS HEADQUARTERS, OREGON MANEUVER AREA, Sept. 23 (AP)—An armistice held 75,000 troops in leash on the desolate central Oregon plateau today after tanks and tank destroyers clashed for the first time in the army's most extensive Pacific northwest war games.

Maj. Gen. Alexander M. Patch, fourth corps commander, abruptly halted the second phase late yesterday with Maj. Gen. James L. Bradley's "blue" army on the offensive against Maj. Gen. Gilbert R. Cook's "red" forces. The training lessons of the problem have been accomplished, Patch said.

The Reds were holding stubbornly along a 20-mile front against the blues, which had a two-to-one numerical superiority. The red line was some 60 miles northwest of Burns, the blue objective, but blue reconnaissance patrols had penetrated to Burns and road blocks were thrown up on the red supply lines.
