

'BAD CHECK' SEASON OPENS IN KLAMATH

This is bad check season in Klamath Falls. Every fall, according to L. Orth Sisemore, district attorney, sees an increase in worthless checks here. In the last two weeks, Sisemore said, one individual put out seven bad checks, totaling over \$200. Another violator passed one for \$1425.

The district attorney's office, in connection with the Merchants' Credit Service, Inc., is making a concentrated effort to reduce these crimes. To make it effective, however, the cooperation of the local business firms is needed, Sisemore said Friday.

It's suggested that local business houses exercise great care in cashing checks for individuals whom they do not know. Identification should be demanded. Sisemore stated that the Merchants' Credit Service has adopted the policy requiring their members to have the persons cashing checks place their finger print on the check, and he suggested that other merchants follow this policy.

Sisemore also said that his office is going to send out bulletins to business houses on bad checks, and requested that any business firm desiring to be put on the mailing list for these bulletins call his office or the Merchants' Credit Service.

NO DELAY OF OREGON HUNT SEASON SEEN

SALEM, Sept. 24 (AP)—State forestry officials are not seriously concerned about forest fire hazards, it being doubtful that the October 1 opening of the deer hunting season will be delayed.

A 1943 law provides that if the game commission postpones or cancels the hunting season, it must give five days' notice. So the commission must act by tomorrow if it plans to delay the season's opening.

However, Governor Earl Snell has power to close forests to entry without giving notice. If he did issue such an order, there still could be hunting in non-forested areas.

Governor Snell indicated today he is not seriously considering closing the forests to entry, and will do so only if the hazard becomes greater.

Near and Middle East) it will be Britain who will have to give way.

UNLESS the United States should make the colossal mistake of going in off the deep end, regardless of its own national interest, FOR BRITAIN and AGAINST Russia.

It should be repeated that what is here said is opinion based on pure guesswork.

We little people on the outside are being told nothing at all about these larger developments that are beginning to show their outlines above the dust of the fighting.

So we HAVE to guess.

It might be much better if we were told more.

When Mussolini made his alliance with Hitler, the Italian people were not consulted. If they had been consulted Italy would now be infinitely better off for every instinct of every humblest Italian peasant would have been AGAINST the alliance that has proved so DISASTROUS for Italy.

The instincts of its people are often a more dependable guide for a nation's course in international affairs than the deals made by its professional diplomats.

It seems to this writer that there is altogether too much hush-hush about this business of Russia's aspirations and ambitions and purposes and what we are to do about them—if anything.

What we do about Russia at this moment in history will affect our lives and the lives of our children and our children's children. It would be much better if the facts involved could be brought out into the open so that they might be discussed intelligently instead of being merely guessed at.

In that way, the instinctive reactions of our people might make themselves felt BEFORE instead of AFTER it is too late.
