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Death of Herriot Rumored in Sweden

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP)—

The Finnish radio, quoting the Swedish newspaper, Svenska Dagbladet, said today that the former French Premier Edouard Herriot had died in a sanatorium in the "south of France."

The broadcast, recorded by U. S. government monitors, said the Svenska Dagbladet carried the report of Herriot's death in a dispatch from Berlin.

Early in September, the nazis announced that Herriot had fallen "incurably" ill of a mental ailment and was confined to a sanatorium.

Greeting Card Shortage Seen

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 24 (AP)—You can get that holiday mailing list out of the bureau drawer and strike off two-thirds of the names, says Carl Austin, greeting-card wholesaler who today predicted a shortage of 1943 Christmas cards.

The supply will be about what it was last year, Austin said, but on the basis of present orders the demand will be from two to three times greater than in 1942 which was a record year.
