

PLANS MADE FOR USO UNIT AT TULELAKE

TULELAKE—R. H. Gosman, San Francisco field officer for the USO, met Wednesday with Mrs. French Johnson, chairman of the local USO unit and other members of the committee in regard to establishment of a USO headquarters for soldiers at Camp Newell.

Funds will be provided for work in the service center that is being sponsored by the Tulelake Cadettes in the room donated by Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Gresham which was formerly used as a showroom for the Modoc garage. However, no funds are available for a headquarters at camp.

Interior of the room is being painted and the opening date is scheduled for the near future.

Gosman was accompanied here by Frank Hunt, war chest chairman for the northern California region, who conferred with R. M. Prior, who will serve as local chairman of the war chest drive which will get under way next month.

Gosman and Hunt, with Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. M. V. Maxwell, were guests of the Rotary club luncheon Wednesday. Mrs. Earl Murray, Alturas, USO chairman for that district, was also present.

Floyd A. Boyd, program chairman for Rotary, introduced R. D. Eller, Klamath Falls insurance representative, who spoke on the value of insurance and the use of surplus insurance company funds in the war effort.

State Guard

The customary rendezvous in the hills west of town, was again the scene of the fourth series of maneuvers conducted by the Oregon state guard, on Sunday, September 19. Having in former maneuvers, gone through training in "scouting and patrolling," "combat practice and interior guard duty," the exercises this week were on "training in field tactics."

After the order to "fall in" was given at the armory at noon, the battalion was conveyed to the battleground, where the various platoons were deployed for the attack. The first objective was an enemy mortar concealed in a clump of plum brush. The advance was made in much better form than on previous occasions. When within range, the attackers were met with a barrage of shells (1 lb. sacks of flour) which having a high trajectory, nevertheless forced the storming troops to dodge the missiles, belching forth at the rate of one every two seconds. The "Bazooker Mortar" was silenced when bayonets were prodded into the backs of chief gunner, Sgt. Simmonds and gunner's mate, PFC Smith. Without stopping to count the number of towns and villages taken, attention was immediately directed to a distant machine gun that had been laying a cross-fire on the flank of the attackers. PFC Martin and his squad had camouflaged their machine gun so cleverly that its position was difficult to observe.

As the attacking forces came closer, there was suddenly an apparent lull in the activity of the machine gun. Major Van Fleet, acting in the capacity of referee, watched the trend of the battle through binoculars. He was in a position to observe that the

enemy, unknown to the attackers, had stealthily retreated, only to re-appear just as suddenly on the rear of the right flank (to the surprise of both sides) whereupon he called that phase of the battle a draw.

During a rest period, information came in that some peculiar form of enemy was menacing the command post from the hills west of the camp. It soon became apparent that Lt. A. L. Anderson, erstwhile intelligence officer of the battalion, had "deserted," and was now in command of an enemy consisting of PFC Frink with others, and equipped with two machine guns, had strongly entrenched themselves prepared for battle. Consequently, the battle raged anew.

Lt. Anderson surprised the "regular" army by giving them an unscheduled lesson in jungle fighting as practiced by the yellow monkeys of the land of the now-setting sun. Although differing from them in portly avoirdupois, he climbed to the top of a juniper tree, from which position he not only directed the machine gun fire, but when Corp. Fowler and his squad (who happened to be in control of the sector) came, unsuspectingly to a point directly beneath him, he "wiped them out."

At six o'clock, both armies, weary and dirty, although in excellent spirits, were treated to a dinner of hamburgers, fresh from Lt. Larson's griddle. First served were the boys from Lakeview, who did that city proud in having 12 men travel the 100 miles to attend. Present were Lt. DeShazer, Sgt. Minton, Corporals Patrick and Claudson and Privates Murphy, Chapman, Parker, L. Hiatt and M. Hiatt.

Lt. C. L. McDonald was unable to attend these maneuvers, as he is one of the four officers from Oregon attending officers' school at Boise. Company "B" and the entire Klamath Falls OSG is proud of this assignment.

Extend Corn en Casserole

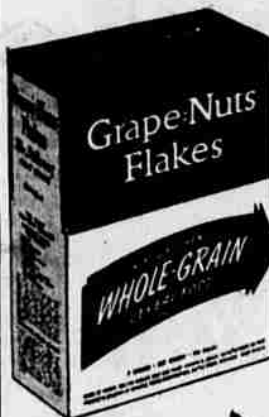
