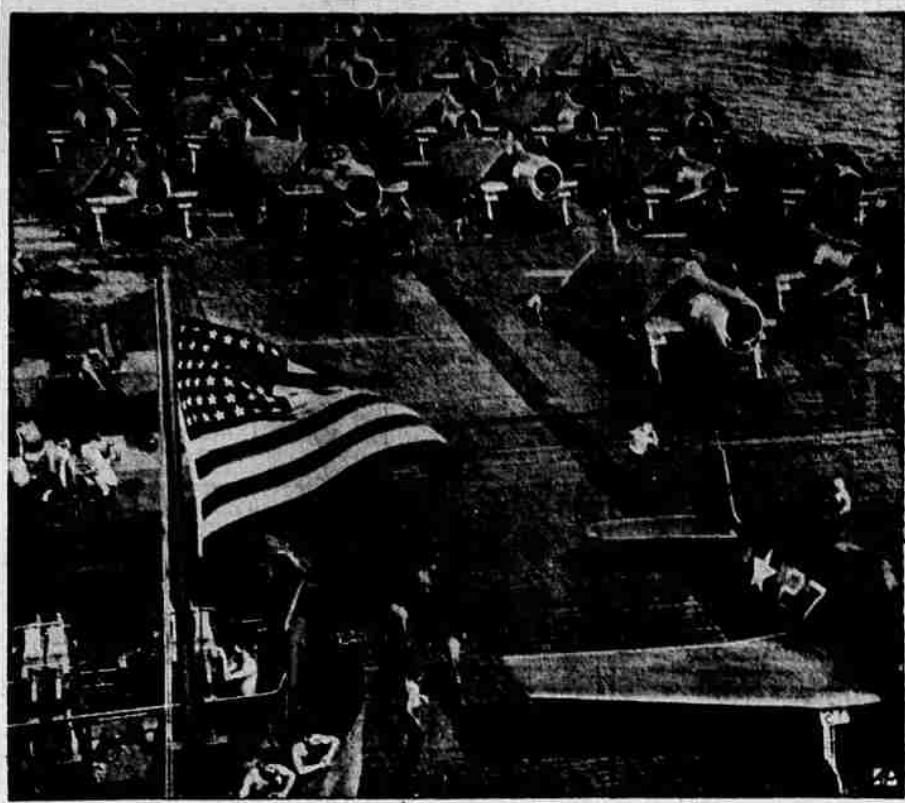

Delightful Indian Summer Adds Zest to Daily Tasks; Origin of Name Uncertain

"There I lingered all October through
In that sweet atmosphere of hazy blue."

Indian summer in all its unmistakable haziness and warmth and light has already this autumn been scattering its beneficence over many sections of our country and adding zest to the tasks which daily await us. To those whose cares are not too heavy, this delightful season can scarcely fail to inspire hope and add to the joys of living.

Indian summer is a condition rather than a definite period of autumn. We usually think of this dreamy and exhilarating weather as occurring in October, yet it is often clearly recognized in September or as late as November. Some years there are two or three definite spans of real Indian summer.

Study of early weather records indicates clearly that the name originated in America about the year 1800. The first reference to it appeared in Major Denny's journal in 1794 when he wrote, "Pleasant weather. Indian summer is here."

gathering their crops of maize, or Indian corn.

Still others think the name originated from the customs of the Indians during this dry, warm period of the autumn to burn the grass from the open ranges intended for pasture the following year, or to burn the underbrush to drive out the game. As a result there was a great deal of smokiness in the still air.

Some try to connect the season with the Indian legend of Shawondasse, ruler of the South Wind. When he sighed in the autumn, balmy southern air was said to bring warmth and delight over the land—thus bringing Indian summer.

Whatever the origin of the name, Indian summer remains a delightful autumn season.
