

National Week To Be Observed

Plans Announced for Special Affairs in October; Lieut. Herring Guest Speaker at Dinner

National Business Women's week, to be observed from October the tenth to the sixteenth, was brought to the attention of the Klamath Falls Business and Professional Women at a well-attended dinner meeting last Monday evening at the Willard hotel.

Miss Lillie Darby, chairman of the committee on affairs for that week, announced that it would start off by members of the Klamath club attending in a group the eleven o'clock morning services at the First Methodist church on October the tenth.

Then, in the afternoon of that Sunday, another of the club's enjoyable teas will be held at the home of Mrs. Dena Backes on Pacific Terrace. Members are urged to bring guests to this affair which, according to Mrs. Backes is to be informal. (Meaning if you don't have your new Fall hat yet, don't stay home for that reason.)

Radio talks by Mrs. Isabel Brixner, president of the Oregon federation, and Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, president of Klamath Falls BPW, will be given during the national week on the topic, "Living on the Home Front". This will also be the program theme for the club's first meeting in October when representatives from other organizations will be invited to participate in a panel discussion.

Monday night's program chairman, Mrs. Suzanne Hamilton, introduced Lieutenant Betty Herring of the WACS, who listed the qualifications of the corps, the method of induction, how members are clothed and told how the ideas of army officers had changed in regard to women being in the army.

The lieutenant stressed that there are over six hundred jobs in the army that women can do, thus releasing men for active duty, and asked each member of the club to personally be a recruiting committee of one in an effort to interest more qualified women in this branch of the service.

"Great Britain has had conscription of women for many months", Lieutenant Herring stated, "And it is destined for this country if the women do not come forward."

Mrs. Gillen, presiding at a short business session, announced a last-minute call for discarded nylon and silk hosiery as these must be shipped in October.

"Pass the word along to your neighbors and friends," she urged. "I have seen some of the articles such as powder bags and parachutes made from discarded hosiery, and can unqualifiedly say that it is important that these be turned in for re-use."

Miss Olive Wilson explained the change in making dinner reservations and stated that cards were to be sent out this week which must be returned as soon as possible in order that lists may be made up for the social chairman, Mrs. Jacquelyn Newcom, and her assistants.
