Advisable to Attend School While Waiting Army Draft

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON—Young men subject to induction in the near future who wonder about the advisability of attending college during the interval between high school graduation and the time of induction will find it advantageous to remain in school during the interval, advised E. M. Pallett, executive secretary and registrar of the University of Oregon in an interview Thursday.

Pointing out the value of preliminary training, Mr. Pallett said basic ROTC training would be offered at the university this fall. He feels that students attending college and pursuing academic work at the time of induction are more mentally alert and in better training to take the

army examinations given at the time they are inducted, and as a consequence more likely to make better scores which will lead to greater opportunities for advancement. The inductee who prefers service in the navy should bear in mind that the navy puts as much stress on training in mathematics, physics, etc., as does the army.

Students attending college up to the time of induction will have an opportunity to study mathematics, physics, chemistry, and other subjects which are considered very valuable by the army. Students taking such courses at the time of induction will have better opportunity for assignment to specialized training units where they will con-

tinue their university work while earning commissions in the army.

Until a young man takes his physical examinations, he cannot be sure he will be inducted into armed service because there is no longer any limited service. Hence, he might as well be getting all the credits he can inasmuch as he is probably better off financially than he has been in years, Pallett remarked. Not only can his parents assist him financially, but work may be procured on the campus and in the college community at good wages, which will materially assist in financing his education.

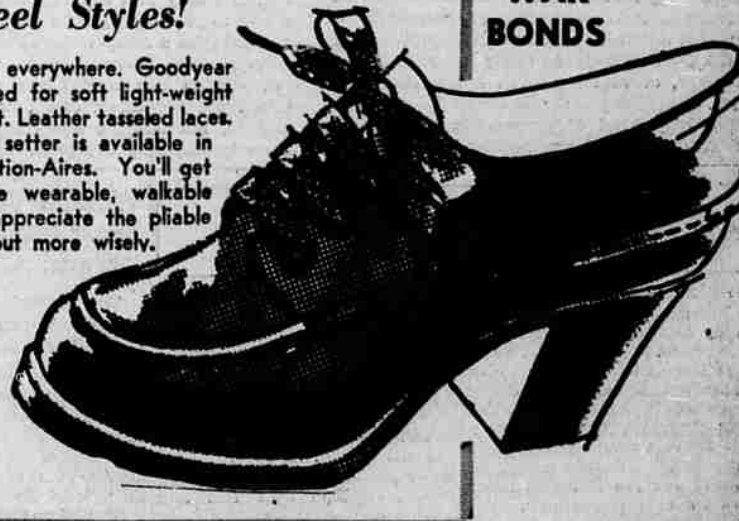
