Mr. Janssen was stricken Wednesday. He was given the Kenny treatment but respiratory paralysis developed, according to Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer. The case was considered a critical one from the start and despite efforts of physicians and nurses who conducted the Kenny treatment on a 24-hour basis, the patient expired.

Dr. Rozendal reported a six-year-old child a patient in the isolation hospital, suffering from meningitis. The child has received the sulphadiazine drug and is responding to treatment.

A donation of a two-burner stove for use in the Kenny treatment, and several more all-wood blankets was reported by Dr. Rozendal.

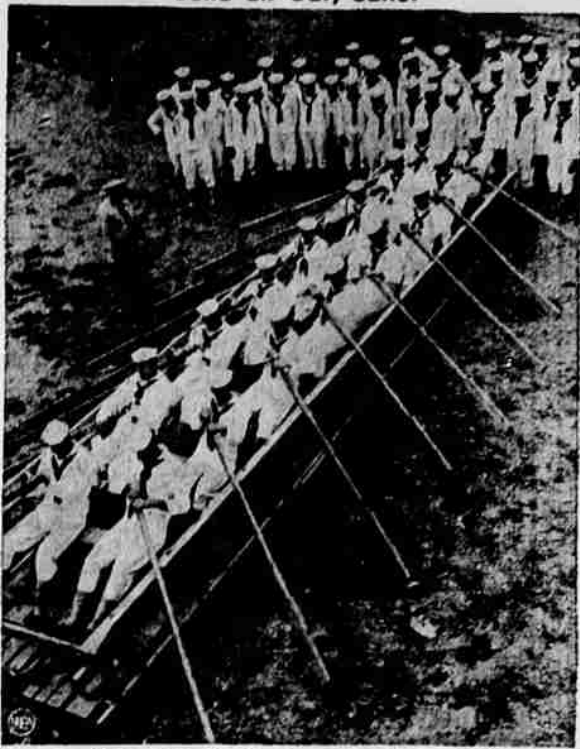
OBITUARY

Justice Court Records Show 'Private Wars' Waged Here

Apparently not satisfied with the world war going on in other theaters, some Klamath folk are staging private wars of their own, or at least so justice court records show.

Every month sees at least one assault and battery case, and during May of this year there were seven. In some cases, weapons of various types are used and in others, would-be warriors, go to work on each other with their fists.

As in the regular armed services, men are not the only ones indulging in this pastime. In several cases, women have been involved, sometimes two women or more rarely a woman and a man.

Among causes for local civil warring, J. A. Mahoney, justice of the peace, said, are drinking, infidelity, quarrels over property rights, assault with the intent to rob, and just plain disagreements, which seemingly can't be settled with mere words.

During the past few months more than 30 cases of this kind have appeared for sentencing in justice court.

Latest defendant in an assault and battery charge is James Thomas Watkins who is accused with assault while armed with a dangerous weapon. In the complaint, signed by his wife, Watkins allegedly assaulted her with a knife. Watkins, who appeared before Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney, Saturday, was committed to the county jail under \$5000 bond.

Assault while armed with a dangerous weapon is a felony, punishable with from one to ten years in the state penitentiary, Judge Mahoney said. Defendant this week in another case, similar but less serious, was Robert Bailey who pleaded guilty to an assault and battery charge and was fined \$50 or 25 days.

LAND BANK BUYS BONDS IN KLAMATH

Klamath county's war bond subscriptions have been boosted \$17,000 by the investment of the Federal Land bank of Spokane, H. E. Hamaker, secretary-treasurer of the National Farm Loan association, announced today.

The land bank, which serves the four states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, has just invested \$3,000,000 in bonds, of which \$500,000 has been credited to each state and \$1,000,000 to Spokane, home city of the bank, R. E. Brown, bank president, advised Hamaker.

The state allocation, in turn, has been credited to each NFLA group office county on the basis of the number of land bank borrowers.

Seven Lose Lives In Denver Army Plane Crash

DENVER, Sept. 27 (AP)—Army authorities said today the seven airmen killed yesterday in the crash of a four-engine bomber in a South Denver residential section heroically chose to plummet into a vacant lot rather than risk a glide which "undoubtedly would have carried them into a row of houses."

The bomber, a B-24 Liberator, crashed and exploded. Flaming gasoline showered several houses nearby but no civilians were hurt and civilian property damage was comparatively slight. The plane was based at nearby Lowry field.
