STOCKS SHOW SOME MODEST RECOVERIES

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Stocks registered modest and selective recoveries in today's market with rails doing a bit better than other sections on the comeback. Bonds were steadier.

Action of the railroad emergency board in recommending a much smaller wage increase for operating employees than had been requested was partly responsible for revival of the transportation group. Another \$1.50 dividend by Santa Fe was helpful.

Transfers were only around 600,000 shares. Trends stiffened at the start but many leaders were indifferent and, while gains of fractions to a point were fairly well distributed near the close, the losing ranks were well filled.

In front most of the time were Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Northern Pacific, Western Union, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, Colorado and Southern Common and Preferreds, Douglas Aircraft, Sears Roebuck, Allegheny Preferreds, United Corporation Preferred (at a new 1943 high), DuPont and Oliver farm. Occasional retreaters included American Can, Anaconda, American Smelting, Westinghouse and Union Carbide.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Sept. 28 (AP)—All grain futures, led by the bread cereals, advanced sharply today as suspension of trading in wheat futures on the Winnipeg exchange brought into the pits a flurry of buying activity by outside and local interests.

Reported action of the house agricultural committee in approving a 100 per cent parity price as a floor for basic crops stimulated a new buying force just before the close that carried wheat prices to new high levels since July. Prices had reacted moderately from the sharp opening advance after the urgent demand of traders evening up spreads with the Winnipeg market appeared to have been satisfied in mid-session.

All grain futures prices reacted somewhat from the day's highs and wheat closed 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 higher than yesterday's close, December \$1.504-1/2; May \$1.501-1/2; oats finished 1/2 to 1 1/2 up, December 77 1/2-1/2; and rye 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 up, December \$1.091-1/2.

Butter Points Up As Supply Drops; Meat Values Same

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—Reflecting still-dwindling production, another sharp increase in the ration cost of butter—from the current 12 to 16 points beginning Sunday—was announced today by the office of price administration (OPA).

The point values of most meat will remain unchanged, OPA said, except for some slight upward adjustments.

Processed food changes for October, announced last night, called largely for stiff increases in canned fruit values although there will be small reductions for some important vegetables.

The increase in butter points was the third and largest in as many months. The original cost was eight points, which was increased twice by two points.

Butter Supply
The amount of butter available to civilians continued to dwindle during September because production fell an estimated 10 per cent under a year ago, OPA said in explanation.

OPA said farm (or country) butter would be raised also from six to 10 points, and announced: 1. Standard cuts of beef, veal and lamb remain unchanged, while several lamb and veal variety meats are reduced one point.

2. A total of eight standard pork cuts, including center chops and loin roasts, are increased one to two points.

3. Eighteen meat cuts, mainly variety types such as brains and kidneys, are now point-free.

4. A number of cheeses, including cream cheese, cream cottage cheese, Swiss, Bleu and Camembert, are increased a point a pound.

Pork Increase
The pork item increase, attributed directly to heavier government demands, will bring the ration cost of cut chops up two points to 11, for example, tenderloin up one to 11, and loin-center roasts up two to 11. Spare-ribs go from two to four.

Among variety cuts removed from rationing are beef, veal and lamb-mutton brains and kidneys, and pork ears, tails, kidneys and snouts. Canned pigs feet and brains were also eliminated.

Processed Foods
In the processed foods program, shortages of supply and military needs brought sharp advances for No. 2 size cans of red sour cherries (14 to 25), all other cherries except maraschino, (14 to 23), grapefruit (10 to 18); No.

2 1/2 size apricots (27 to 36), figs (13 to 21) and prunes or plums (7 to 15). There is also a rise of 3 points a quart for grape juice.

No. 2 cans of asparagus are up 4 points, but green and wax beans are down 2 points, vacuum-packed whole kernel corn is down 4 and other corn (except on the cob) down 3.

Mushrooms, the four-ounce size, were another item given an increase, going from 3 to 5 points.

Reduced to a zero rating but not completely removed from the ration list are dried peas and lentils, which may be given values later.

WINNIPEG WHEAT MART SUSPENDED

OTTAWA, Sept. 28 (AP)—Suspension of wheat trading on the Winnipeg grain exchange was announced today by Canadian Trade Minister J. A. MacKinnon. MacKinnon said the Canadian wheat board was taking over at Monday's closing prices and until the board had completed the necessary arrangements the closing out of future contracts would be at those prices.

The board's initial payment to producers on authorized deliveries beginning today and for the remainder of the crop year 1943-44 and for the full crop year 1944-45 will be \$1.25 per bushel, basis No. 1 northern wheat, in store at Fort William, Port Arthur, or Vancouver.

The minister said the change in wheat policy was necessary because of the unusual circumstances surrounding the marketing of Canadian wheat under present conditions.

PORTLAND, Sept. 28 (AP)—Executives of the Kesterson Lumber company, Klamath Falls, and the Timber Products corporation, Medford, have requested the Oregon Safety association to make safety surveys at their mills.

SUGAR
October 31—Expiration date of Stamp No. 14, valid for 5 pounds. Stamps 15 and 16 are each good for 5 pounds of sugar for home canning purposes only.

SHOES
October 31—Expiration date of Stamp 18, valid for one pair of shoes. Family stamps are interchangeable.

RATION BOOK 2

Red Stamps: (Meat and fats.) October 2—expiration date of Stamps X-Y-Z.

RATION BOOK 3

October 20—Expiration date of Stamps U-V-W.

Brown Stamps: Meat and fats. October 2—Expiration date of Stamps A and B. Stamp C becomes valid September 28; D on October 3rd; E on October 10; and F on October 17. All expire October 30.

RATION BOOK 4

Registration for this book is scheduled for October 20 to November 1. War Ration Book Two must be presented at registration.

GASOLINE

September 21—Expiration date of Stamp No. 7 in A Book.

"C" book holders must have tires inspected every three months with at least 45 days elapsing between inspections.

"B" book holders must have tires inspected every four months with at least 60 days elapsing between inspections.

"A" and "D" book holders must have tires inspected every six months with at least 90 days elapsing between inspections.

Roth Murder Trial Gets Underway

PORTLAND, Sept. 28 (AP)—The first-degree murder trial of 16-year-old Rudolph Roth Jr., charged with the shooting of his sleeping father last April, got underway today following the selection of a jury yesterday.

James R. Bain, district attorney, said the boy confessed slaying his 51-year-old father after an argument. The youth told him he also had intended to kill his sister and mother but abandoned the plan after only wounding his sister with one of his two remaining bullets, Bain said.

Stettinius Up for Senate Approval

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (AP)—President Roosevelt today formally submitted to the senate for confirmation the nomination of Edward R. Stettinius Jr., to be undersecretary of state.

The chief executive announced Saturday night his acceptance of the resignation of Sumner Welles as undersecretary and the appointment of Stettinius to succeed him.
