

FOLKES GETS EXTENSION OF APPEAL TIME

ALBANY, Ore., Sept. 28 (AP)—Voluminous testimony in the "lower 13" murder trial has given Robert E. Lee Folkes a fourth extension in time for making an appeal to the state supreme court from his death sentence.

Still unfinished is a transcript of the shorthand notes taken during the trial last May. It was revealed in circuit court yesterday as Judge L. G. Lewelling moved the deadline to November 10 at the request of Defense Attorney Leroy Lomax, Portland.

Prosecutor Harlow Weinrick, consenting in the delay, said the record of testimony would fill more than 800 pages.

Folkes, Los Angeles negro dining car cook, was convicted May 28 of slaying the throat of Mrs. Martha Virginia James, 21, Norfolk, Va., in berth lower 13 of a train passing through Oregon last January 23.

Twenty Officers, Men Killed in Transport Crash

U. S. TENTH AIR FORCE HEADQUARTERS IN INDIA, Sept. 28 (AP)—Twenty U. S. army officers and men were killed last Tuesday in the crash of an army transport plane near Calcutta, it was disclosed here today.

Lt. Marlan Lowell of Alderdale, Wash., pilot of an American transport which landed at Calcutta a short time after the crash, said he "never saw a more complete washout. The wreckage was still burning when I sat down."

BID TO BE OPENED ON LAPINE PROJECT

SALEM, Sept. 28 (AP)—The state highway commission announced today it would open bids in Portland October 12 on eight projects costing \$350,000.

Among the projects are: Baker and Malheur counties—Provide 22,800 cubic yards of crushed rock on Baker-Weiser junction rock production project on the Old Oregon Trail.

Deschutes and Klamath counties—Provide 20,000 cubic yards of crushed rock on LaPine rock production project on The Dalles-

California and Fremont highways.

Jackson county—Provide 10,800 cubic yards of crushed rock on Ashland-State Line rock production project on Pacific highway.

Jefferson county—Grading, surfacing and oiling 1142 miles on access road to Madras-Redmond air base target range.

Army Bigwigs Look At War Games in Central Oregon

FOURTH CORPS HEADQUARTERS, Oregon Maneuver Area, Sept. 28 (AP)—Army bigwigs, headed by Lt. Gen. Lesley J. McNair, chief of ground forces, toured the eastern rim of the central Oregon desert today where 75,000 troops were locked in mock battle.

Gen. McNair and 11 key staff officers arrived by plane yesterday on the heels of a party of visiting officers from Washington, D. C., and posts in Kansas, Kentucky, California and Washington.

The troops were jockeying for an initial advantage along an

area extending roughly 85 miles from Crooked river on the north to positions south of Wagonville on highway 395.

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union (CIO) who recently returned from a trip to the war zones, charges the state department exerted all its power to frustrate his mission to study maritime conditions abroad.

"When we arrived at a North African port," he said at a press conference yesterday, "every member of the crew was given shore leave with one exception—Joseph Curran."

"I was informed that 'by or-

der of the state department' I was not permitted to go ashore. I was also informed that if I descended the gangplank I would be shot and there were soldiers with tommyguns there, waiting to do the shooting."

I FOUND, long ago, that fall vegetables can really be both good and different! Take parsnips and rutabagas, for instance. If your family hasn't been too keen about them before, they might like them this way. I know my family does, and they're inclined to turn up their noses at them served in any other way. Here are some suggestions for those two fall vegetables, and others too:

CANDIED PARSNIPS—Wash and scrape or peel parsnips, and cook whole or cut in halves lengthwise. Cook covered in small amount of salted water, about 30 minutes or until tender. Drain, sprinkle with brown sugar, salt and pepper, and bake in moderate oven about 15 minutes, basting parsnips once or twice with hot water and meat drippings. Serve as you would sweet potatoes.

SPICED RUTABAGAS—(This goes for turnips, too). Wash and slice rutabagas, and cook covered until tender in just enough hot, salted water to create a steam, about 15 minutes. Drain and mash and season with salt, pepper and a little ground cinnamon and clove if you like.

CAULIFLOWER SALAD—Wash cauliflower, and separate into tiny flower-lets or chop coarsely. Add raisins, chopped apple, chopped nut meats and marinate in a tart light dressing. Serve on a bed of shredded spinach. This really tastes better than it sounds!

STUFFED SQUASH—Use small individual squashes like Danish. Split squash, remove seeds and parboil in salted water until almost tender. Drain and fill cavities with chopped, cooked meat and tomato mixture. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) for about 30 minutes or until squash is thoroughly tender and meat mixture is heated through.
