

FIFTH ARMY MOVES INTO BURNING PORT

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city of Pompei, at the foot of Mt. Vesuvius, and also seized Mercato San Severino.

Pompeii Taken
Pompeii lies 10 miles south of Naples. Mercato San Severino is about 22 miles southeast of Naples and eight miles beyond Nocera, whose capture was announced yesterday.

The daily war bulletin, chronicling events of yesterday, made no mention of allied troops actually investing Naples, as reported by the Cairo radio. It was reasonable to assume, however, that they had at least reached the outskirts of the city, once Italy's second greatest port.

Enemy Covers
"The enemy continues to cover his withdrawal by extensive demolitions," it was announced.

Gen. Eisenhower's command said the British 8th army, driving up the Adriatic coast on the opposite side of the Italian peninsula, continued to make satisfactory progress and reached the seaside town of Manfredonia after a 20-mile advance.

Nazi Fury
German fury over reverses in the field was reflected in a broadcast by the Nazi-controlled Italian radio, which declared the Nazis would take "pitiless" reprisals against the people of Naples if they persisted in "getting in the way in the fight against the Anglo-Americans."

While Clark's army continued its unbroken advance, Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's eighth army along the Adriatic continued to consolidate the newly won air bases at Foggia, only 160 miles from Rome, and branched out to reach Manfredonia on the coast in a 20-mile advance from Zapponeo.

Nation's Casualties Total 115,000; Salerno Included

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (AP)—War casualties of the nation's armed forces have reached approximately 115,000.

Secretary of War Stimson disclosed today that army casualties to date total about 85,000 while figures announced by the navy department placed naval casualties at 30,162.

The navy total included 11,258 dead, 5305 wounded, 9458 missing and 4143 taken prisoner. The total, Stimson told a press conference, included the period

from December 7, 1941, through casualties at Salerno, and up to and including September 15.

Salerno Total
The casualties at Salerno, where the allied beachhead was established in Italy and now is expanding, totaled 3500 killed, wounded and missing.

Stimson gave this breakdown for the war casualties, not including Salerno:
Killed 10,682.
Wounded 26,666.
Missing 23,743.
Taken prisoner 20,451.

Since the landings in Sicily on July 10 American casualties in the Mediterranean theater of operations up to the Salerno campaign amounted to 1455 killed, 5213 wounded and 1736 missing, Stimson said. Nearly all of these casualties resulted from the Sicilian operation, although some were the result of air action and some included previously unreported figures.

Stimson said that of the 26,666 soldiers wounded in the war to date, 10,975 have either returned to duty or been discharged from hospitals.

He said that it was "gratifying to note that the Salerno casualties were less than we feared."

Oregon Has 18 New Paralysis Cases

PORTLAND, Sept. 30 (AP)—Eighteen new cases of infantile paralysis were reported in Oregon during the week ending September 25, the state board of health said today.

The rise of the disease—four cases more than the preceding week—was concentrated in Multnomah county, with five cases, and Marion county, with three. Two cases were reported in Yamhill and Lane counties, and one each in Benton, Clackamas, Deschutes, Douglas, Linn and Klamath.

Liberated Italian Prisoners Fighting Way to Join British

BERN, Switzerland, Sept. 30 (AP)—Several thousand British prisoners of war, liberated by the Badoglio government after the armistice, have succeeded in partly arming themselves and are trying to fight their way south to join the British eighth army in Apulia, the Milan newspaper Italia reported today.

FBI Man Testifies Dainard Not Abused

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 30 (AP)—Julius H. Wright, of the federal bureau of investigation at Portland, Ore., testified today that William Dainard, 41, neither was threatened nor abused when Dainard was arrested here May 7, 1936, on the charge of kidnaping George Weyerhaeuser of Tacoma, Wash.

He was a witness for the government in connection with Dainard's petition for a writ of habeas corpus and freedom from Alcatraz prison, where he is serving a 60-year sentence imposed in Tacoma. Dainard has contended he was not properly represented by counsel, and that he was ill-treated by FBI men connected with his arrest and transfer to Tacoma.

Tulelake Japs Arrive at Hunt Center in Idaho

HUNT, Ida., Sept. 30 (AP)—Movement of 1527 residents of Tule lake relocation center to Hunt was completed today.

This is part of a general war relocation authority program to concentrate Japanese of questionable loyalty at the Tule Lake center in California where 254 were sent from Hunt. This made a net population gain of 1273 for Hunt, which now has a population of 8175 not counting 1280 who are working outside the center, mostly on farms.

Approximately 350 of the Tule lake residents signed up for farm work before arrival here, and are going onto jobs immediately.
