

Irrigation Season Continues Until October 10

DRY WEATHER BRINGS WORD FROM HAYDEN

The irrigation season in the Klamath project will continue until about October 10, the latest closing date on record, it was announced by Reclamation Superintendent B. E. Hayden today.

He said that due to dry, warm September weather, it was decided as desirable to continue irrigation service beyond September 30, the usual closing date.

This will enable farmers to irrigate pasture and late seeding.

NEW LOAN SEASON OF FSA STARTED

New 1944 records for increased production of war foods by smaller farmers and FSA borrowers in Klamath and Lake counties are being planned as farm security administration opens another loan season, it was announced by Earl A. Gardner, county supervisor, Thursday.

Loans can now be made for livestock, machinery, feed, seed, small water facilities, and joint-ownership of equipment, sires, and other operating goods.

"Every small or family-type farmer or present FSA borrower lacking funds or credit to raise more cows, hogs, chickens, or important war crops in 1944 may make loan application as soon as possible," Gardner said.

FSA borrowers, numbering over 120 in Klamath and Lake counties, not only increased their war food production for the second consecutive year from 10 to over 30 per cent, but shattered all repayment records by meeting over 90 per cent of all maturities due, even though many loans run up to five years, Gardner reported.

Administration costs for entire FSA program run only 4.3 per cent of total FSA assets.

Hours during which applications are received at the county office are from 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon on Mondays and Saturdays of each week.

Improved Pastures To Boost Milk

Assistance to dairymen in increasing milk production by improving pastures is afforded by recent AAA program developments, believes John Shepherd of Selo, member of the state AAA committee.

Additional shipments of superphosphate will be available in November and December for distribution through the AAA conservation materials program. Since a new AAA program year will be in effect then in all Oregon counties, farmers who could not obtain sufficient phosphate from previous shipments this year because of farm allowance limitations will be able to order from this extra allotment. Definite assurance has been received that application of phosphate to that application of phosphate to legumes and grasses will be included as a practice in the 1944 agricultural conservation program, Shepherd reported. Rate of payment is expected to remain at \$24 a ton, the same as this year.

More Edible Beans Needed Next Year

Oregon growers who undertook large scale production of dry edible beans for the first time this year may plan 1944 plantings with the assurance that war needs for this high-protein food crop will continue high next year, reports R. B. Taylor, chairman of the Oregon USDA war board.

Indications are that 1944 needs will call for still larger production than this year's bumper crop, Taylor said.

Most of this year's record crop was grown in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Around 50,000 acres were harvested in Oregon, with Umatilla county growing the largest amount.

NO SUPPORT FOR AUSTRIAN PEAS

Heavy production of Austrian winter peas throughout Washington, Idaho, Oregon, and California has so increased the supply that the government will be unable to maintain a support price on this crop for 1944. Along with Austrian winter peas there will be no support price for Willamette vetch.

Henceforth, a considerable quantity of these peas has been grown in the Klamath district and growers could always secure the government support price of 5 cents per pound, but the greatly increased yield in neighboring states and commercial sales of Austrian peas at 2 1/2 to 3 cents, has made the government support price impossible to maintain. Growers planning on planting peas this fall and next spring in the Klamath basin should do so knowing that a considerable acreage will be grown and that no support will be maintained.

There will be a support price for hairy vetch, ryegrass, and probably for common vetch.

Shipment of nearly 800 carloads of potatoes so far puts this season ahead of last year, but it was pointed out today that the spuds which have moved are largely number 1's, and a serious problem exists as to number 2's.

There is no market for number 2 spuds. Ordinarily, more cars of 2's would be going out along with the heavy shipment of first grades, but this year most of the

2's are going into storage. The weather is warm and a serious food loss is occurring.
