STOCKS SHOW YEARNING FOR HIGH PLACES

NEW YORK, Oct. 1 (AP)—Stocks generally displayed moderately higher leanings in today's market although exceptions were plentiful.

Near the close, a number of early declines were erased and replaced by small advances. Copper revived in the final hour. Transfers were around 500,000 shares.

Canadian liquor stocks were given a lift by buying orders from Montreal. Hiram Walker jumped more than 3 points to a new 1943 peak and Distillers Corp.-Seagrams was up better than a point. Resistant were Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Western Union, Bethlehem, Sears Roebuck, Deere, American Smelting, Patino Mines and American Telephone. In the losing column most of the time were Great Northern, Standard Oil (N.J.), General Motors, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, Dow Chemical, Johns-Manville and General Electric.

Complaint Session Will Probe Food Distribution

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—A nationwide complaint session has been arranged by the government to find out directly from retailers and wholesalers what if anything is interfering with the fair distribution of foods and civilian goods.

Representatives of the office of civilian requirements (OCR) and the war food administration (WFA) in 20 selected cities, accessible to every merchant, between October 11-30. A conference will be held in Seattle October 25-27; in Sacramento October 20-22.

Merchants will be allowed 15 minutes each to tell what obstacles appear to be preventing them from getting enough goods to meet their customers' needs.

Officials suspect, for instance, that some manufacturers have not adjusted delivery quotas among regions to match wartime population shifts, so that boom communities are getting insufficient supplies.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 1 (AP)—Buying by mills and distillery interests reversed an early lower trend in wheat today, the market coming back to score minor gains over yesterday's close at times. Trading was moderately active. The strength in wheat was reflected in oats and rye, which rallied from opening lows.

Satisfactory crop reports prevented any sharp upturn. A report from Iowa said samples of new corn were the best ever seen and that many fields will produce in excess of 100 bushels an acre. The modern miller, trade publication, said yields of spring threshed, were fully up to wheat in the northwest, now expectations.

At the close wheat was 1-1/2 higher, December \$1.51 1/2, May \$1.52, oats were 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, December 77, and rye was up 1/4, December \$1.09 1/4.

FEDERAL BUTTER 'TAKE' REMOVED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 1 (AP)—Butter producers gained a measure of freedom today. They no longer have to "set aside" a portion of their make for the government.

It meant a little more butter for civilians. But experts said it would be "very little more."

Sam Greens, manager of the California dairy council, estimated production would give each consumer about one-half pound a month for the rest of this year. Civilian stocks are next to non-existent.

The last report he had, Greene said, showed 213,000,000 pounds in storage—virtually all owned by the government.

Dr. George Hart of the University of California College of Agriculture remarked that the government "has enough butter to feed all the men in uniform for a year without buying another ounce."

Greene said there was a simple solution for the civilian shortage—without taking any of the government butter.

"Pay for it," was his solution.

Western Pine Shipments Increase

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—Shipments of western pine lumber during the week ending September 25 rose to 79,466,000 board feet, from the previous week's 76,012,000, the Western Pine association said today. Shipments of the corresponding week last year were 101,999,000. Production stood at 87,348,000 feet, as against the preceding week's 88,261,000 and last year's 100,892,000. Orders totaled 67,215,000 feet, compared with 67,251,000 the previous week and 99,039,000 last year.
